District AA Meet Held

A state-wide drive to aid uncontrolled drinkers spearheaded by Alcoholics Anonymous is making substantial gains, according to Oregon leaders of AA who were in Klamath Falls for a series of weekend conferences.

Doc D. of Portland, secretary of the AA State Service Committee, explained that rehabilitation of an alcoholic is just as long a process as treating persons suffering from tuberculosis or other major diseases.

"Alcoholism is now rated by leaders of the medical profession as America's No. 4 killer among diseases," he said. "There are thousands of victims of alcoholism in Oregon. Alcoholics Anonymous has been able to help many alcoholics. However, unless a person really wants to quit drinking we can do nothing for them."

The eight members of the state committee were entertained at breakfast Sunday in the Spruce Room of the Willard Hotel by members of the Klamath Falls AA group.

The committee members also attended an open meeting Saturday night in the AA Center, 120 Riverside, Maple Park.

Wool Growers Re-Elect Chiefs

ROSEBURG — Top officers of the Oregon Wool Growers Assn. — John Withers, Paisley, president; Julian Arrien, Vale, vice president; and Victor Johnson, Pendleton, secretary — were re-elected here Saturday.

E. R. Jackson, of Corvallis, range crops specialist for the State Extension Service, told the final session of the organization's annual meeting that the new trend in grazing is to move large numbers of livestock into small areas of pasture daily. This allows the pasture to recover, increases the forage yield, and results in lower feeding costs, he said.

Another speaker was Gail Smith, promotion manager for the Producers Livestock and Marketing Assn., Salt Lake City.

Eugene Dog Track Backers Withdraw

PORTLAND — Four of the original incorporators have withdrawn from a group which is proposing a greyhound dog racing track in the Eugene area, Sidney Milligan, Eugene attorney, said Saturday.

Milligan, who represents the group, said Reeves Taylor, Spencer R. Collins, George F. Hitchcock and Ralph Parr, all of Eugene, had dropped out of the enterprise.

Those remaining are R. E. Toner and Archie Weinstein. The Lane County Board of Commissioners was expected to take action this week on whether or not to recommend that the State Racing Commission grant a license for the proposed track.

Senators Debate Congress' Role Towards New Dams

WASHINGTON — Two Western senators, a Democrat and a Republican, differ on whether the new 84th Congress will be more or less reclamation-minded than was the old 83rd.

Sen. Murray (D-Mont.), slated to head the Senate Interior Committee when the Democrats take

over next month, says the Democrats will "get the federal government back in the business of building big dams." The Interior Committee handles such legislation.

Sen. Watkins (R-Utah) says the Republican-controlled 83rd Congress was favorable to reclamation, and only time will tell whether the 84th will be as favorable.

Bills to authorize the federal government to build several multi-million dollar dams are expected to be introduced soon after the new Congress convenes Jan. 5.

Watkins said he and other Western senators will introduce the Upper Colorado River storage project bill "on the first day for introduction of bills or very soon thereafter, and we will press for early hearings."

Also expected to be introduced are bills to authorize the 400 million dollar Hells Canyon Dam in the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon, and the 172 million dollar Frying Pan-Arkansas project in Idaho.

Sen.-elect Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore) and Rep. Gracie Plost (D-Idaho) boomed Hells Canyon during their recent successful political campaigns.

A hint that the Democrats may press for fast action on Hells Canyon was dropped by Sen. Murray in a recent talk with reporters. Murray said he and other Dem-

ocrats would "stand pat" in a fight for Hells Canyon. This could mean that the Democrats may attempt to get a Hells Canyon authorization bill through Congress before the Federal Power Commission rules on the applications of the Idaho Power Co. for

licenses to build three private power dams in the Hells Canyon area. The three dams would flood the proposed federal dam site. The FPC may rule on the applications late next year.

If the Democrats, with a slim majority in Congress, succeeded

in passing a Hells Canyon bill they will be outdoing the Democratic Congress which several years ago, under a Democratic administration, couldn't get a similar measure through committee.

And such a bill possibly would run into a veto since the project

does not have the present administration's approval.

Snow Reported On Highways

Spots of ice on the Willamette Pass were expected to be melted and the highway clear by 10 a.m. today, according to the Oregon Motor Association's local office.

Greensprings Highway is clear. It was raining between here and Medford this morning, according to AAA.

Six inches of new snow fell at Crater Lake National Park in the 24-hour period ending at 8 a.m. Monday, bringing the total on the ground to 15 inches.

Highway 62 into the park is open but very slippery in spots, according to the park ranger station. Chains or abrasive tread snow tires are advised.

The warming hut is open week-ends. There is still not enough snow for skiing.

Two Injured In Auto Crash

An accident at the Malin - Tulalake junction of Highway 39 at mid-afternoon Sunday, resulted in a broken collar bone for a passenger in one vehicle and hospitalization of the driver of the other car.

According to Oregon State Police a car operated by Roy Lee Watts, 28, Bonanza, with passengers Samuel Lewis Ford, Melvin Cornelius Dixon and Willie Mayweather, all of Bonanza, and Otis Elmer Miller and Lillie Lee Miller, 600 Broad Street, Klamath Falls, traveling north from Tulalake was struck by a Malin bound car operated by Eleanor Stone, 39, General Delivery, Malin.

Mrs. Miller was treated at Merill for a broken collar bone and released.

Hospital authorities this morning stated the Stone woman was still hospitalized but extent of her injuries could not be learned. Mrs. Stone's physician was not available for a report on her condition.

Other passengers in the Watts car escaped without injury, officers stated. Both cars were damaged considerably.

Accidents Claim 3 Oregonians

Weekend accidents claimed the lives of three in Oregon.

James Gaylor, 13-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lee Gaylor of Union Gap, 12 miles north of Roseburg, was killed outright Saturday when an automobile driven by his uncle backed over him. The child had been playing in the driveway and the uncle, James A. Bodine, did not see him as he backed his automobile at the Gaylor home.

Oral Pons, 75, died in a Portland hospital early Sunday after he had been struck by an automobile as he crossed a Portland street. He was the city's 33rd traffic victim this year.

John Klein, 28, Portland, was killed outright Sunday when he touched a high voltage power line after his automobile hit a power pole at Sauvie Island.

Chinese Report Typhoon Damage

HONG KONG — Local Chinese papers reported today that Typhoon Pamela sank 1,100 fishing boats along the south China coast and that 3,000 persons — fishermen and their families — drowned or are missing.

The reports, from independent sources on the mainland, termed the typhoon the "worst disaster to the fishing people of south China in a century." The storm hit the Chungshan coastal area Nov. 7.

New Employees Ask Strike Vote

PORTLAND — AFL Typographical Union employees of Portland's two dailies, the Oregon Journal and the Oregonian, voted Saturday to ask their international for permission to have a strike vote.

J. Jay Walton, president of the local, said the action was taken to back up the union's demands in contract negotiations. The present contract, which expired Sept. 15, provides for a weekly wage of \$109.50, he said. Walton said the union was asking a weekly increase of \$3.80.

Negotiators for the two newspapers reported they had offered a \$2.50 weekly increase, plus other benefits which in some cases would amount to 63 cents per week. They added that at the union's request they will resume negotiations Tuesday.
