New Business Land Levelled

The leveling of land for Klamath's second business and shopping center in the southeast suburban area started last week.

Ten acres of land on the northeast corner of Shasta Way and Alameda, owned by John Fehlen, 3803 Frieda, is being leveled by a cat and carryall owned by Charles Himeilwright, local excavator.

Roland E. Wright, real estate operator, is handling the sales of sites on the new project. Fehlen stated. Several lots are already sold and construction work on some of the buildings is expected to start this fall.

In addition to business sites about four acres have been set aside for a super-service station and trailer court.

The leveling job is expected to be completed in about 10 days and involves the moving of approximately 14,000 yards of dirt, Fehlen said.

Premier Wins In New Zealand

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP)—Prime Minister Sydney G. Holland still holds power today following New Zealand's general elections, but his parliamentary majority has been whittled down.

Virtually final returns from Saturday's balloting showed the Premier's Nationalist party holding 43 of the 80 seats in the one-house legislature. Labor held 37. In the old house the Nationalists held 50 seats to the Laborites' 30.

Temperance League Holds Convention

DALLAS (AP)—There are nearly four million "problem drinkers" in the United States, says Dr. Duke McCall, president of the National Temperance League, Inc.

He told some 200 persons opening the league's three-day convention yesterday that of that number, 750,000 are "true chronic alcoholics."

McCall is president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky.
