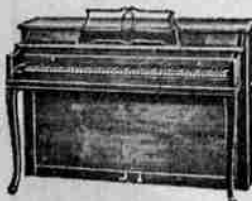

FORT ROCK

The Fort Rock Bible school teachers and their families met recently at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Howard McGee for a potluck supper and to view a film strip in connection with Bible school teachers study.

Thursday evening Rose McGee received the shocking news that her father Alfred Andrews, had died suddenly earlier that evening. Howard and Rose left immediately for Bend to be with Mrs. Andrews. Al Andrews was cutting wood with Jack Lynch when he suffered a stroke. He died on the way to the hospital in Bend. Mrs. Andrews and Lute Henderson were with him.

Alfred Andrews, will be greatly missed by the many friends he made during the many years he lived in the Fort Rock - Silver Lake area.

James Alfred Andrews was 65 the time of his passing and a resident of Silver Lake. He was born in Missouri. He came to Fort Rock about 1912 and homesteaded here. He worked for the Fish and Wildlife Service from 1912 to 1916. For a few years he operated the Crescent Lake Lodge and also owned and operated the boats on the lake. He sold out and went into the store business and was postmaster here in Fort Rock from 1926 to 1931.

He trapped for himself for several years, then in 1935 he became connected with the Deschutes Forest Service at Cabin Lake until 1940. From there he went back to government trapping until 1949 at Silver Lake area. He worked at the following occupations the past few years, forest service foreman at Stams Well, janitor at the Silver Lake school, and since April he has been a real estate agent for the Stout Realty Company.

In 1926 Alfred Andrews trapped a rare species of bear called "Lava" bears, these bears are miniature and weighed about 25 pounds. They are now exhibited in the Smithsonian Institute, as they are the only species that have ever been known to exist. They were trapped in the lava's in the

He was a wonderful woodsman and sportsman, and in many instances acted as hunting and fishing guide. Many an interesting tale was told by him of his different experiences in outdoor life.
