

Oregon Tech Team Seeks Share of Conference Flag

Coach Rex Hunsaker's Oregon Tech Owls enter their final week of football practice as they prepare to meet the strong Southern Oregon College Red Raiders this Saturday afternoon in Ashland.

After taking the first day of the week off, following their tough and muddy caked battle with Oregon College last Saturday, the Mile High Campus coaching staff put their charges through the first practice sessions of the week yesterday afternoon.

Hunsaker and his assistants, Bob Smith and Art Kirkland have indicated that the Red Raiders may be stronger than the average person gives them credit and could spell trouble for the Owls and a clear cut championship for OCE, their bitter rivals of the Oregon Collegiate Conference football race.

PENNANT

The Wolves are currently riding on top of the conference standings with the Owls and Red Raiders sharing the number two spot. The Owls could jump into a first place tie with the Wolves by winning this Saturday's game, but a loss or tie to the Ashland school would mean certain death to any hopes that the Owls might have had to cop an OOC pennant.

Leading the SOC offensive barrage will be a little powerhouse, Jimmy Wright, the grinder who throws, catches, kicks, runs and plays a bangup defensive game while Glen Nelson and Ralph Perkins will probably lend plenty of support to the Ashland school's backfield.

Two other possible starters that have been sidelined for discipline reasons could also be in the starting unit when the Owls and Red Raiders meet head-on Saturday as Len Heston, the barreling fullback and Bill Seymore, the teams leading quarterback, could see action.

EX-PELICAN

Leading Southern Oregon's potentially strong line will be Morris Jimenez, a KUHS graduate and ex-Pelican football star, at one of the tackle spots, while Tom Quinowski, another local high school graduate, will be opening against the Owls at one of the guard positions.

The Owls will be seeking to get back on the winning path after being sidetracked by OCE last week by a 27-7 score, and pick up their sixth win against four losses for the season.

Hunsaker and his assistants are still undecided as to a starting lineup for the SOC contest, which will be the last for several OTI gridders, who will graduate this year, but from all indications it will follow last week's game to a certain extent.

At the ends for the Owls will be Ken Sloan and John Alford or Paul Weaver while Charles Eccleston will also see plenty of duty for the Owls at the wing spots. Greene Ridd and Don Pierce will see the lion's share of duty at the tackle positions, with Lyle Lofler or Kent Crawley opening at the center.

SELECTING

The guard positions is the one spot where Smith has his trouble of selecting a starting pair with such talent as Dennis Johnson, a letterman and freshman like Jack Thur, Spike Carter and Stan Smith to choose from.

In the backfield for the Owls, Kirkland will probably open with Ray Rosa or Dave Thomas at the quarterback spot, while Doug Grippen or George "The Mole" Johnson will get the opening call for the fullback post.

The two halfback positions seem to be a toss-up between five griders, two lettermen and three top flight fresh prospects who have shown very well so far this season.

Odie Canada and Lyle Fleetwood are the two monogram winners, while Willie Stinson, Cal "Sugar Jet" Smith and Linous Allen are the promising freshman chargers seeking a starting berth against the Red Raiders.

Game time is 2 o'clock on the Ashland High School football field.

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UCLA, SC Clash Saturday

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The cross-town battle between Southern California and UCLA Saturday will decide the Pacific Coast Conference championship and it could also settle the individual scoring race.

Four players are within six points of each other in scoring and three of them appear in the Coliseum Saturday.

SPINNER

Bob Davenport, UCLA's 203-pound fullback and the man who makes the fullback spinner plays click, leads with 60 points. Southern California halfback Jon Arnett is second with 55 points, while half-backs Primo Villanueva of UCLA and Dick James of Oregon have 54 points each. Arnett's one-point bulge over the other two came via a conversion last Saturday.

Southern California meets Notre Dame on Nov. 27 but the rest of the conference teams finish Saturday.

HONORS

Meanwhile, George Shaw of Oregon State leads the conference in rushing with 669 yards to 596 for Jerry Drew of California who rolled up 283 of them last Saturday.

Larson has passing honors sewed up with 111 completions and a 64.2 average giving him a great chance of beating the conference and NCAA marks of 60.9 set by Don Heinrich of Washington in 1950.

Leading pass receiver is Cal end Jim Hanifan with 39 catches good for 510 yards and six touchdowns. Leading interceptions is Bob Iverson of Washington State with five.

RETURNS

UCLA's Bob Heydenfeldt has the best punting average, 41.4, and Sam Brown of the Bruins has the most yards on punt returns, 235. Dennis Rath of Washington State has collected 246 on kickoff run-backs.

In team statistics, UCLA leads in total offense, 379.9 yards per game; rushing offense, 307.2; rushing defense, 81.8; total defense, 200; punting, 38.8; pass interceptions, 23; punt returns, 19.3; and kickoff run-backs, 20.6.

Only California in pass offense with an average of 174.9 yards per game and Oregon in pass defense, limiting foes to 86.4, break the stranglehold in the statistics department.

Ron was tops in all departments. He kept rubbing the MSC passers all afternoon and twice broke through to block punts. He picked up one blocked punt and ran for a touchdown. The other blocked punt led to another score. Offensively he snared several passes and blocked well. He is a good punter, too.
