Mamie Writes To KF Woman

A personal letter of appreciation for some of Klamath County's famous wild plum preserves by Mamie Rogers was received today by Mrs. Leslie E. Rogers from Mamie Eisenhower.

Mrs. Rogers, Klamath pioneer, first sent plum preserves to President candidate and Mrs. Eisenhower when they crossed Oregon on the campaign train in 1952. In acknowledgment of that gift, the president and his wife might information on buying the preserves each year. In turn, Mrs. Rogers has sent a box of preserves for the past two years, giving the couple in the White House a sample of the preserves made from a cultivated tree in the yard at her former home, 651 Pacific Terrace, which she planted, pruned, grafted and pollinated.

This year in answer to a query from Mrs. Eisenhower on the cultivation of plum seeds in other parts of the nation, Mrs. Rogers sent a packet of seeds.

Mamie's signed letter of November 10 follows: My dear Mrs. Rogers: "Thank you for sending the wonderful box of preserves and the plum seeds. We are happy to send the seeds to Gettysburg so they may be planted at once but the delicious preserves will remain with us so that we may have them in the mornings with our toast. Such a treat!

Your friendly gesture is deeply appreciated and we are so grateful to you for your generosity. With all good wishes to you, President and Mamie Eisenhower."

Field, Wife Said Freed By Hungarian Red Government

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — The five-year-old mystery of the vanishing Fields took a new turn today when Hungary's Communist government announced it has released Noel Field and his wife Herta.

There was no immediate indication of the whereabouts of the 50-year-old former U.S. State Department employee and his German-born wife. A spokesman at the U.S. legation in Budapest said the legation had not been informed of the release.

Noel and Herta were among four members of the Field family who vanished at intervals behind the Iron Curtain in 1949 and 1950.

The Hungarian announcement over Budapest radio came only 25 days after Poland's Communist government said it had freed Hermann Field, Noel's brother. Hermann, a Cleveland architect, had been arrested in Warsaw while searching for Noel. He is still in Poland convalescing in a sanatorium.

The latest announcement left only the fate of Noel's adopted daughter Mrs. Robert Wallach still unexplained. Mrs. Wallach, the former Erika Glaser, disappeared in East Berlin Aug. 28, 1951, while searching for her foster father.

During the intervening years, there was no official indication of what happened to the Fields, although their names cropped up in various Iron Curtain treason trials. Communist propagandists accused Noel of being an "anti-Soviet" American spy and linked him to "Hitler" plots in Hungary.

A Hungarian announcement said the Budapest government has

dropped all spy charges against Noel and Herta after a review of their case indicated they could not be substantiated.

In the United States, admitted former Communist Whittaker Chambers, and Hede Massing have testified that Noel Field was once a member of a Communist apparatus in Washington.

After Poland released Hermann Field, Western observers here anticipated that Noel would be turned loose. But American diplomats

said the Hungarian government ignored two notes sent by the U.S. legation in the last six weeks demanding his freedom. The sources said they received no private hints Hungary intended to comply.

The field mystery began in May 1949, when Noel left his wife in Switzerland and went to Prague, Czechoslovakia. He was last heard from in that city May 12. After he disappeared, his wife flew to Prague to look for him and she too vanished.

Noel's name came up in the sensational trial in October 1949 of Laszlo Rajk, then Hungarian foreign minister. Rajk was accused of scheming with Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito to hand the country over to "American imperialists." He was hanged.

The prosecution at the trial described Noel as an assistant to Allen Dulles (now head of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency) in the Office of Strategic Services—a U.S. cloak-and-dagger organization during World War II—with the job of organizing American espionage in Russian-occupied areas of Europe.

is located. It might also create a new way of carrying radioactive atoms to cancers to destroy them.

A chemical obtained from human blood is injected into a person's veins. This chemical, porphyrin, lodges in cancer tissue.

Then when body tissues are examined under ultraviolet or invisible black light, the porphyrin shines with a red light of danger as bright as a woman's lipstick.

So far this method has outlined entire cancers in a few human bodies, telling surgeons the extent of the cancer for complete removal. Doctors D. S. Rasmussen-Taxdal, Grant E. Ward and Frank H. J. Figue of Baltimore told the American College of Surgeons.

There is hope that the porphyrin can be combined with iodine so that it would show up under X-rays.

That would mean a person could have the injection, then be X-rayed or fluoroscoped to see if he has cancer, and where it is.

The porphyrin-iodine presumably would go to any places where the cancer had spread in the body and reveal those locations for life-saving treatment. The spreading action, called metastasis, is one reason why many people die of cancer. The original cancer is removed, but its seeds already have spread elsewhere, take root and grow.

Another possibility is that radioactive atoms could be attached to porphyrin, and be carried to the sites of cancer to root them out with lethal radiation.

Rasmussen-Taxdal, now spending a year at the University of California Hospital, spoke for the medical team from the Johns Hopkins University and University of Maryland. Figue, head of the team, has long been interested in porphyrin.

New Natural Gas Plant Proposed

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — Several major oil companies are considering the possibility of establishing a natural gas extraction plant at Newcastle, Taylor Bell, director of industrial development for the Wyoming Natural Resources Board, said Monday.

The proposed plant would utilize natural gas now being flared off in the Claretton oil field, he said.

There are no natural gas producers now in that field.

Bell also said there are "a few good indications" that a two to three million-dollar uranium ore processing plant will be located at Newcastle.

Also mentioned as possible sites for the plant are Edgemont, S.D., and Moorcroft, he said.

Teenager Kills Self With Gun

The blast struck 15-year-old Paul Morris in the heart.
