

Carter KO's Champ To Regain Lost Title

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The world lightweight boxing championship was back in familiar surroundings today—in the possession of Jimmy Carter of New York.

The 30-year-old kinsman from Harlem regained the title last night when he battered Paddy DeMarco of Brooklyn into a mess and submission in the 15th and final round of a bruising, savagely fought battle in the vast Cow Palace.

Referee Ray Flores halted the massacre.

Paddy, 26, making the first defense of the championship he captured from Jimmy in New York last March 5, was out on his feet, his left eye swollen and all but shut and his cheek rapidly assuming a deep blue shade.

Carter now stands as the only lightweight king to win the crown three times. He won it originally from Ike Williams in 1951, lost it to Lauro Salas in 1952, regained it six months later and then surrendered the honor to his rival from Brooklyn.

Twice Carter had his man on the deck—from a whistling left hook to the chin in the ninth for a four-count, and with a barrage of punches just as the bell ended the 14th.

The knockdown in the ninth, the second in Paddy's career of some 23 fights, signaled the outcome. The battering in the 14th spelled out the finish and actually the technical knockout in the 15th was anticlimactic.

Carter called his victory the biggest thrill since he started boxing in 1946.

His manager Willie Ketchum said he has no immediate plans for Jimmy but he is definitely interested in a title match with one of the nation's newest television attractions, California's Cisco Andrade.

Bitter criticism of Referee Ray Flores came from the DeMarco camp. Paddy accused Flores of "pushing" him. "He had me off balance all night," Paddy charged, referring to Flores' efforts to separate the men in the clinching.

"The referee wouldn't let me fight inside," Paddy said. "I'll fight Carter any time. In three weeks, if he wants to, I know I can beat him any time."

Bruins Stake Hopes On Title

UCLA's mighty Bruins stake their hopes of the mythical national football championship on beating their arch rivals, the USC Trojans, Saturday in the featured game of the Pacific Coast season's final weekend.

The undefeated Bruins, just a hair behind No. 1 Ohio State in this week's Associated Press poll, are favored to beat the Trojans and win the Pacific Coast Conference championship.

USC already is assured of a Rose Bowl bid no matter what it does. UCLA, 1954 loser in the bowl, can't play there this winter under PCC-Big Ten rules.

Other Coast teams are meeting traditional rivals in their own big games.

Injury-riddled Stanford tries for its first victory since 1946 over California at Berkeley. However, the Bears—blessed with a stronger bench and one of the nation's top quarterbacks, Paul Larson—are favored.

Oregon, a pre-season Rose Bowl favorite, is expected to whip Oregon State at Corvallis—something the Ducks have failed to do in the four years Len Casanova has coached Oregon. Oregon State, which hasn't won a game since beating Idaho in the season opener, will have to come up with some thing new if the Beavers are to stop Duck quarterback George Shaw, one of the nation's top passing wizards.

Washington and Washington State meet in another old rivalry at Pullman. Idaho plays Brigham Young at Boise and San Jose State meets Fresno State at Fresno Friday night.

Trojans Stress Defense

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Word has come from the secret practice field that the University of Southern California Trojans are stressing defense as they prepare to meet UCLA Saturday.

It's no surprise since the high scoring Bruins, undefeated and united in eight games, have scored the first time they controlled the ball against all opponents except Maryland.

Underdog
Coach Jess Hill undoubtedly believes if he can stop the first Bruin charge the chances of the underdog Trojans go up.

With the conference title at stake, the Bruins striving to regain their No. 1 spot nationally, and the Trojans seeking a clear title to the Rose Bowl, a capacity crowd of 102,000 will see the game.

Southern California already is the PCC choice for the Rose Bowl since UCLA can't repeat against the Big Ten champion because of a provision in the pact between the two conferences. But the Trojans don't want to be the first second-place PCC team to appear at Pasadena.

A quarter century ago the rivalry between the two schools started with the powerful Trojans manhandling the baby Bruins 76-0 and they still lead the series with 14 victories, 5 defeats and 4 ties. But times have changed. The Bruins are favored this week and they've won three of the last five meetings.

There's no doubt Southern California has improved since Texas Christian handed the Trojans their only loss in nine games. Now ranked in a seventh-place tie by The Associated Press poll, the Trojans ran up 27 points in the first quarter last week to lambast Washington 41-0. Earlier in the season, when the Northerners were admittedly much stronger, they fell to UCLA 21-20. But Bruin supporters point out the Washington scores were made against reserves after UCLA had a 21-0 bulge.

Drivers Await Big Road Race

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Tense excitement gripped the overcrowded little jungle town of Tuxtla Gutierrez as the world's top automobile drivers made final preparations for Friday's Pan American road race.

An estimated 140 cars will roar across the starting line at dawn to start the 1,908-mile, five day contest which will pay winners \$117,200 in prizes.

They come from Europe, South America, Central and North America to participate in the longest and most dangerous automobile race in the world.

Nine were killed last year. Two have died in trial run accidents this year even before the race started.

Tuxtla Gutierrez, in tropical Tehuantepec Peninsula not far from the Guatemala border, was a scene of confusion Thursday. In addition to the drivers and their many mechanics, reporters, race and government officials poured into the overcrowded village.

There was one bright prospect: The Weather Bureau said the weather would be good for the first leg, a 329.3 mile dash from Tuxtla Gutierrez to Oaxaca.

There are five categories entered in the race which ends Nov. 23 at Ciudad Juarez on the Texas border: Big sports cars (about 18), small sports cars (9), large standard makes (25), small standards (70), and European standards (19).

NY Gets Turley, Larsen In Trade

NEW YORK (AP)—In a move to revamp their pitching staff in one sweeping deal, the New York Yankees have picked up Bullet Bob Turley and Don Larsen, a pair of young righthanders, from the Baltimore Orioles.

The trade may involve as many as 12 players. The Associated Press learned from an authoritative source.

PROMISING

In addition to Turley and Larsen, perhaps the most promising of the young pitchers sprinkled among the also-ran teams of the American League, the Yankees also reportedly received shortstop Billy Hunter.

In return, the Yankees, who had made repeated inquiries about all three Orioles in the past, gave up veteran outfielder Gene Woodling, pitcher Harry Byrd, first baseman Eddie Robinson, utility infielder Willie Miranda and Jim McDonaid, a 4-1 righthander. Several minor league players also are said to be involved.

The deal—one of baseball's biggest in recent years—was expected to be confirmed today in two separate press conferences called by the Yankees and Orioles.

BELIEVED

Two of the minor league players are believed to be catchers—Gus Triandis, who played at Kansas City last season, and Hal Smith of Columbus (Ohio).

Neither Turley nor Larsen had impressive won-lost records with the seventh-place Orioles. But Turley, 24, powered his fireball for a league-leading strikeout total of 184 and had an earned run average of 3.44 while winning 14 and losing 15.

Larsen, 26, had a miserable record, winning only 3 of 24 decisions, but still was held in high regard by the league. One of his victories was a shutout against the second

place Yanks, who lost out in the pennant race for the first time since 1949.

The Yanks lost little in giving up Byrd, who finished with a so-so 9-7 record that fell far below the Yanks' expectations when they picked up the 30-year-old hurler along with Robinson in an 11-play deal with the Philadelphia Athletics last winter.

HOBBLED

Woodling, 32, a Yankee for the past six years, was hobbled by injuries last season and batted only .250—his lowest mark in nine major league seasons.

Hunter, 26, has two major league seasons behind him with the St. Louis Browns, forerunners of the Orioles, as "a new Marty Marion."

Not a hitter, he batted .244 last season. He has proved promising in the field and could be the Yanks' replacement for Veteran Phil Rizzuto.
