Volunteers Hunt Two Lost Girls
BECKLEY, W.Va. (AP)—Raleigh County Sheriff John C. Ward called for volunteers today to resume a search for Irene Agee, 8, and her sister Mary, 6, who have been missing since shortly after school Nov. 1. Since that time the section around the mountain community of Egeria has been searched almost daily. Ward said he and state police officers would lead any volunteers from Twin Bridges, six miles away, toward Egeria in the remote hope that the girls may have strayed even beyond the territory already examined.

Earthquake Hits S. California
LOS ANGELES (AP)—A short, sharp earthquake jolted Southern California points yesterday. The shock was felt in Pasadena, Glendale, Burbank, Van Nuys, Hollywood, Compton, and Los Angeles. It swayed buildings in Santa Barbara and light fixtures in Ventura. No damage was reported.

Friction Predicted Over Demos' Legislative Plans

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democratic leaders are shaping up a legislative program almost certain to create friction with President Eisenhower in the new Congress. An outlined yesterday by Rep. Rayburn (D-Tex.), it included, in the controversial area, new farm legislation, pay raises for federal employees and tax revision. Rayburn, who is in line to become speaker of the House when Democrats take over Congress Jan. 5, and Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.) discussed the program after informal huddles with other Democratic leaders here for yesterday's White House foreign policy meeting. McCormack is slated to be House majority leader. The program currently does not involve foreign policy, in that field.

Rayburn told newsmen, Democrats hope for a bipartisan approach and for cooperation. What they want, he said, is "a strong foreign policy and a strong national defense." One of the first things the new Congress will consider, Rayburn said, is a general pay raise for all federal workers, including postal employees. Just before adjournment last summer, Congress sent the President a bill to raise these salaries, but the President declined to approve on the ground Congress did not provide money to help foot the bill. Rayburn said he is opposed to increasing first-class letter rates to 4 cents, as the administration asked to help offset any pay boosts. He did not rule out proposed hikes in other rates.

While some Senate Democrats have said they favor a trial period of at least a year for the new farm price support system, Rayburn asserted he is for "90 per cent parity." Parity is a legal standard for farm prices said to be fair to farmers in relation to their costs. At the President's insistence, the recent Congress replaced the old rigid 90 per cent supports on basic crops with a new law providing for flexible scale ranging between 82 1/2 and 90 per cent of parity. Congress will have to decide early in the year what to do about scheduled reductions in corporation and estate or sales taxes, but no other major tax legislation is likely during the first session of the new Congress. But a new tax law, aimed at removing what Rayburn called "inequities," is almost certain to be considered during 1956, a presidential and congressional election year.



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
