Oregon Douglas Fir Orders Told

PORTLAND (AP) — October Douglas fir production averaged more than 212 million board feet a week, 119 per cent of the 1949-1953 average, the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn. reported Thursday.

Orders averaged 190 million and shipments 205 million. All of these categories exceeded September figures. It was in that month that the summer-long lumber strike ended.

In the first 10 months of this year production is listed at 7,660,822,000 board feet. In the same period last year it was 6,770,228,000.

The unfilled order file at the end of October was 717 million board feet and gross stocks 839 million.
