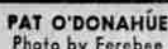

**RIVERTON, Wyo., (P) —** Stockmen voiced fear Wednesday that drought of the past few seasons may permanently cripple the livestock industry as a mainstay of Central Wyoming economy.

Thousands of sheep and cattle from Fremont and Natrona counties are being moved to irrigated pasture for the winter. Pasture rentals are reported up \$2 to \$3 over last year.

Mild weather has given some relief so far to ranchers who have stock grazing in areas ordinarily snowed in by this time.

"One stockman who hadn't had to buy feed in 25 years is out looking for it this winter," said L. J. Geraud.

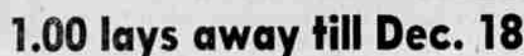
