

Xmas Club Savings To Be Mailed

Thousands of Oregonians will receive Christmas club checks from the U.S. National bank this week in time for holiday shopping.

More than half a million dollars will be distributed this year to the bank's Christmas savings club members, E. C. Sammons, president, announced.

This popular plan for saving for Christmas throughout the year is in its sixth year of operation at the U.S. National. Christmas club members save a designated amount each week. A check for the amount saved is then mailed to each club member in mid-November.

U.S. National's 1955 Christmas club is now open for membership. All a person needs to do to join is get a signature card at any branch office and indicate how much he wishes to save each week. There are plans for any amount from 50 cents to \$10 per week. Although members are encouraged to complete the payments, there is no penalty for non-completion. Sammons pointed out.

Christmas club officials estimate that more than a billion dollars will be distributed nationally through 6500 banks and other savings institutions. The U.S. National bank has pioneered this unique savings program throughout Oregon.

Mrs. E. L. Coyner spoke on "Personality Growth In Children." There will be no more circle meetings until January, 1955.

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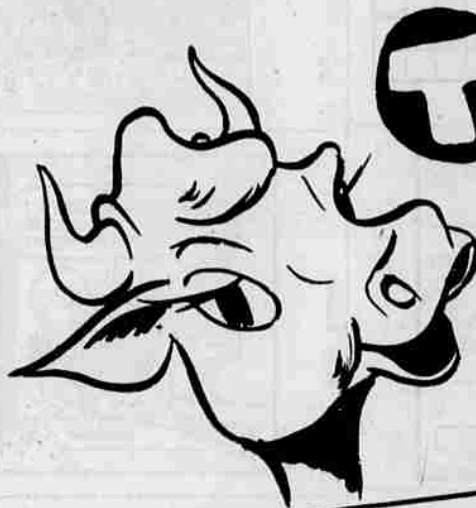
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A STATEMENT OF POSITION

The time has arrived for the producers of Grade A milk, in the Klamath Basin, to state their position as to the supply of milk distributed in this area.

1. There is adequate milk available locally to supply all consumer needs for grade A milk and for minimum manufacturing needs.

2. No milk has ever been sent from the Klamath Basin and no discussion has ever been held regarding the possibility of sending milk to any other market for processing. Any milk processed elsewhere and delivered locally is not produced in the Klamath Basin, but produced elsewhere. The Klamath Basin Grade A Producers Pool is paid the difference between the surplus price of that milk in the area in which it was produced and the pre-repeal price for bottle and can milk in the Klamath Basin.

3. The local producers were informed this transaction would be made regarding such milk brought in, but were not given any choice as to whether or not the milk would be brought in.

4. The local producers position is: We are in the business of producing an adequate supply of top quality milk for local consumption. Our margin is small, and we must sell the highest percentage of our produce into the highest return channels possible. We do a large volume of business locally, and will not knowingly work a hardship on any local businessman.
