

Brooklyn Dodger's Switch To West Coast Still Seen

NEW YORK, (AP)—Despite all the denials being flung about, we are advised by a man close to the Brooklyn situation that there is every probability the Dodgers will be sold and moved either to Los Angeles or San Francisco within another year or two.

As the situation was explained to these ears, the Dodgers are making a certain amount of money where they are, but not enough that anything important is left for Walter O'Malley, the club's president and majority stockholder, after all obligations have been met.

Among the most important of these, we are told, is a large chunk of currency, more than \$70,000, which must go annually to Branch Rickey in continued payment for the Brooklyn stock the Mahatma surrendered when he sold out to O'Malley and transferred his operations to Pittsburgh.

These payments still have seven years to go, and they serve to keep the Brooklyn prey constantly afflicted with the financial shorts, which is not a happy condition.

There is no handy way of increasing the club's income. Its home park, Ebbets Field, officially seats about 32,000 spectators and there is no possibility of adding even one more chair short of abolishing the outfield.

This capacity serves nicely most of the time, but it becomes a serious drawback when a big series comes up against one of the contenders such as Milwaukee and the Giants. It prevents the Dodgers from ever playing to the great crowds of 50,000 or 60,000 which occasionally glut the treasures of their rivals.

SITUATED
The land upon which the tight little park is situated, smack in the heart of Brooklyn and convenient to all forms of transportation, is held to be very valuable. During Rickey's regime the club also bought up a mess of surrounding property, some of it now being used as parking lots.

All this, we are reminded, adds up to a whole lot of money just waiting to be accepted and socked in the bank the moment O'Malley decides he has had enough of living in comparative poverty and consents to give the West Coast fans a break. Our man estimates that the Brooklyn president, a man of modest beginnings, might come out of the transaction with something close to three million.

Vic Janowicz Seems Set On Pro Football

WASHINGTON (AP)—Professional football fans in the nation's capital have had precious little to cheer about this season, but they are gradually whetting it up for a halfback who was playing major league baseball while the Washington Redskins were in training.

The halfback is Vic Janowicz who seems now to have completed the football - to - baseball - to football swing.

In 1950 Janowicz was an All-America halfback for Ohio State. It was his field goal that won the Rose Bowl game for the Buckeyes over California 17-14.

IGNORED
A better than fair catcher for the Ohio State baseball team, Janowicz first ignored football offers from the Redskins and went to work as a bonus player for an old Columbus friend, owner John Galbreath of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Vic won few cheers at Pittsburgh, last season his batting average was a dismal .131. The Redskins' owner, George Preston Marshall, kept after him, trying to tell him his athletic career was in football, not baseball.

Janowicz at last saw the light and signed with the Redskins at the end of the 1954 baseball season. He had none of the benefits of pre-season drills, but promptly won himself a starting job in the Washington defensive backfield. "Normally," says his coach, Joe Kuharich, "it takes a man at least six weeks to get into shape for pro football. Not Janowicz, though. He was in better shape when he showed up in Washington than some of the players who had been working out for two months."

QUICKLY
Vic's best football weight is 186. He weighed in at 180 when he joined the Redskins but picked up the necessary weight quickly and soon developed into the Redskins' most aggressive defensive halfback.

There is no giving up in Janowicz's makeup. He isn't satisfied with a tackle until his man is stretched out prone on the field. He has made mistakes defending against passes, but more than once he has moved into another player's territory to bat down passes he had no right to reach. Kuharich is giving Janowicz a shot at an offensive assignment in a reshuffled lineup and expects Vic to develop as his best running halfback.

FOUNDING
A fine kicker, Janowicz has been taking care of the kickoff chores and sharing punting duties with another former All-American, Charlie Justice. Kuharich regards him as a sure shot for field goals.

Janowicz's 15-yard field goal in the last period beat the Baltimore Colts, 24-21, giving Washington its first victory after five setbacks. Under his agreement with Gal-

Draft Meeting Underway

NEW YORK, (AP)—The majors

launched their annual draft meeting today but the big baseball news may emanate from another session, held by the National League alone, later in the day.

Although they insisted only routine business was to be discussed, reports persisted that the National League executives were to discuss plan for invading California and expanding into a 16-team circuit.

Provision for such expansion already has been made by the National League, as well as the American League. It was believed the older league was determined to press for immediate investigation of such future sights as Los Angeles and San Francisco, in a race to win those two rich Pacific Coast League territories from the American League.

The owners may also hear from Bill Veeck, former head of the St. Louis Browns, employed by Phil Wrigley of the Chicago Cubs to explore the major league possibilities of Los Angeles and Frisco. In order to add either of these cities, the majors would have to graft it and pay damages to the remaining Pacific Coast League clubs.

"I wouldn't be a bit surprised if the 10-club matter came up at our meeting," an unidentified National League club owner said. "I believe both major leagues will consist of 10 clubs within two or three years."

As for the draft, baseball men predicted a light selection from the minors, even lighter than last year, when only 13 players were promoted, costing the majors \$132,500. Of this group, six managed to last out the season.

Rams Edge Giants; Lions Top Packers

The Cleveland Browns and the New York Giants, two of professional football's finest defensive clubs, collide at the Polo Grounds in New York Sunday in a game that should settle the wrestling for the Eastern Division title of the National Football League.

"They'll have a psychological edge," New York Coach Jim Lee Howell said. "They beat us last month 24-14."

Coach Hampton Pool of the Los Angeles Rams won't pick a winner but he calls the Giants the most improved club in the league.

"I couldn't believe the Giants were that good," Pool said. "They'll be tough for Cleveland. They'll be up. This is their 'must' game."

This was after the Rams had beaten the Giants 17-16 in a football melodrama yesterday.

The Browns for their part, in front of the Giants with 6-2 turned in a great defensive effort against the Giants' 6-3.

Detroit, after a bad scare, slipped by Green Bay 21-17 and took a firmer grip on its third straight Western Division championship.

In other games, the Chicago Bears took Baltimore 28-13 and the Chicago Cards thumped Washington 38-16. San Francisco dumped Pittsburgh 31-3 Saturday night.

Twice yesterday New York fought from behind, led 16-10 at the half and might have pulled it out with a fourth-period field goal. Ben Agajanian's kick from the 42 bumped the crossbar and dropped back onto the playfield.

BEHIND
Right behind New York's Howell in the Coach of the Year running is Paul Brown, who has squared away his Cleveland machine after two defeats in the first three starts. The "new" pros from Cleveland have now taken five straight.

Two field goals by one of Coach Brown's veteran indispensable, Lou Groza, dropped Philadelphia out of sight in the Eastern race. The Eagles have a 5-4 record now. The Cleveland defense, which did not hold up its end in the early games, stopped Philadelphia cold. Late in the final period the Eagles had a first down on the Cleveland 10 and were shut out.

Detroit tightened the vice on the Western Conference with its seventh victory in eight starts. This one wasn't easy. Bobby Layne threw two touchdown passes and rammed over for a third score but a dropped Green Bay pass might have led to the year's biggest upset. Late in the fourth quarter Packer Max McGee let a Tobin Rote pass get through him. He was clear in the end zone.

CONCUSSION
Ollie Matson, in what was perhaps the best individual performance of the day, came off the injured list and scored four touchdowns in the Cardinals victory over Washington. Matson went 61 and 79 yards on his two best efforts. He suffered a concussion two weeks ago against Philadelphia.

Zeke Bratkowski, the great rookie from Georgia, was the man in the driver's seat for Chicago as the Bears hung it on Baltimore. The "Brat" threw for one score and set up two others, one of which he carried over himself. It was Baltimore's eighth loss in nine games.

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
