Knowland Asserts US Must Aid Nationalist's Defense

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) said today the United States "must not permit" Nationalist-held islands off the China coast to fall to the Communists, lest this open the way for a Red assault on Formosa.

Knowland, the Senate Republican leader, spoke out in an interview after the official Chinese Nationalist News Agency reported yesterday the Reds have moved a paratroop division into position for possible attack against Nationalist outposts off the coast.

The Californian said he does not believe this country can brook any Communist advance into the Pacific.

"We should continue to give logistic support for Quemoy and the other islands," he said. "But if it should develop that the Communists are mounting a major effort to move out into the Pacific and seize these outposts for an assault on Formosa, we must not permit them to fail."

"Any movement of the Communists out into the Pacific would not be to the advantage of our interests. Theoretically, of course, the loss of the island of Quemoy and the Tachens would not necessarily be a fatal blow to Formosa. But the psychological advantage the Communists would gain all over the world would be tremendous."

Knowland said he felt that if the Chinese Communists were aware this country would fight to defend the offshore islands they probably would not attack.

President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles, while making plain it is administration policy to fight in Formosa's defense if necessary, have not been clear on this point as regards the offshore

islands. The matter reportedly has been the subject of some argument within the administration.

The GOP Senate leader said there had been suggestions—he didn't say from where—that the Nationalists withdraw from the smaller islands to consolidate their forces on Formosa. But Knowland said he believed this would be a "fatal policy" which would lead to eventual loss of Formosa itself.

Knowland said he believes Nationalist defenses would make Quemoy "a tough nut for the Communists to crack."

The Chinese Communists have made threatening movements, shelling Quemoy and launching small scale attacks in what some administration officials were said to regard as an effort to test American intentions.

Chiang Kai-shek and other Chinese Nationalist officials have been reported asking for guarantees of more American help in defending the outposts than the present provision of equipment and supplies. There has been no indication that such pledges are contemplated.

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Milk Floods Canada Island

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I. (AP)—Prince Edward Island is a land flowing with so much milk it's a problem what to do with it.

Healthy islanders drink lots of milk and use a lot of butter and cheese, but 98,000 people can't keep up with 48,000 good dairy cows.

The cows have such a long lead, in fact, that at the end of September there was a surplus of 1,412,000 pounds of butter—about a fourth of the yearly production on this island in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

H. J. MacDonald, dairy superintendent of the Agriculture Department, acknowledged the situation is causing concern. If Canadian federal subsidies on surplus butter ceased, the whole price structure of the dairy industry could be toppled.

Nova Scotians buy half the butter produced on Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick is another big market. Some is shipped to the rest of Canada and to the United States, but demand just doesn't keep up with supply.

What's the answer to the surplus production?

MacDonald says it could be canned milk. If it could reach a wide enough market it would use up most of the milk now going into butter stockpiles. Only one company on the island now cans milk.
