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### New Spud Pack Offered In KF

TULELAKE—First packages of the new K.P. Potato Pack, fresh, peeled potatoes ready for French fry and boiling have been offered to consumers at the Big Y Market in Klamath Falls to determine consumer reaction to the new product put out by the Klamath Potato Processors Inc. of Tulelake. Shipments have also been made to markets in San Francisco, Oakland and Los Angeles.

The first packages for local consumption are a 1 1/2 pound size, selling for 19 cents. Other packs will be in 3 and 5-pound bags when the demand warrants. The company also plans preparations of larger sizes for restaurant, dining car and steamship trade.

The present output is on a minimum scale. Full operation of the plant is expected to get under way about the first of the year. The operation is designed to peel potatoes, and dip them in a harmless chemical which keeps them from discoloring from nine to 14 days. The packages are kept under refrigeration but are not frozen.

The company was incorporated in Salem and is the first of its kind to operate in this area.

When full scale operations are under way, the company will pack baker's size potatoes also using sizes for peeling.

Conversion of the Percy Murray building here is under way for installation of processing machinery.
