

Dodgers Lose Ace Prospect

NEW YORK (AP)—Baseball men were still talking today over the way Branch Rickey "put one over" on his former partner, Walter O'Malley by grabbing off one of Brooklyn's prize farmhands for the paltry sum of only \$4,000 at the annual major league draft meeting.

The player is Roberto Clemente, a 20-year-old speedy outfielder who, many report, is a sure-fire star of the future. Clemente was drafted by Rickey's Pittsburgh Pirates as the No. 1 draft choice among the 13 minor leaguers selected by nine big league clubs.

BRILLIANT
Clemente has only one year of professional experience but he was eligible for the draft because he was a "bonus" player who received more than \$4,000 to sign with the Dodger organization. The Puerto Rican, who reportedly received \$20,000 to sign, batted only .257 at Montreal last season but big league scouts were attracted by his brilliant playing with the Santurce club this winter, where he is currently hitting .380.

"He was the No. 1 draft choice on at least four or five clubs," said the jubilant Branch Rickey Jr., Pittsburgh vice president. "He can run and throw. I think he will play too." Other clubs who tabbed him No. 1 included Baltimore, Kansas City, Chicago White Sox and the New York Yankees.

Ordinarily, any player drafted from a Triple A club such as Montreal would cost \$10,000 but a bonus player brings only the \$4,000 limit.

ATTRACTED
"I think the Brooklyn club outsmarted itself in the bid," said Frank Lane, general manager of the White Sox. "I never should have let him play winter ball. That's where he attracted all the attention. I doubt if a club would have taken him based on his .257 batting average at Montreal. I know if I had him, I would have paid him \$2,500, or \$3,000 not to play this winter."

Altogether the majors shelled out \$122,500 for minor league hopefuls, including ex-big leaguers Mickey Grasso, Bennett Flowers and Cloyd Boyer.

Grasso, veteran catcher dropped by Cleveland after the World Series, comes back to the Giants, with whom he received his big league baptism in 1946. Flowers, a former Boston Red Sox relief pitcher, was plucked by Detroit from Louisville, where he had an 11-12 record. Boyer, released by the St. Louis Cardinals last year because of a sore arm, was obtained by Kansas City from Rochester.

PURCHASED
Kansas City spent \$30,000 for three players, all pitchers. Besides Boyer, the club purchased Bon Spencer, a knuckleballer who had a 13-16 record at Los Angeles, and southpaw Art Ceccarelli from the Kansas City roster in the American Assn. Ceccarelli, former Yankee property, had a 15-12 record at Birmingham.

Others taken included pitcher Vincente Amor, 18-11 at Oklahoma City, and outfielder Jim King, a .315 hitting outfielder from Omaha by the Chicago Cubs; right-hander Joe Trimble, 9-12 at Burlington, N.C., by the Red Sox; shortstop John Kline, .319 at Birmingham, by Washington; southpaw Jerry Dean, 15-2 at Greenville, Miss., and outfielder Glenn Gorbous, .283 at Fort Worth, by Cincinnati; southpaw Roberto Vargan, 12-13 at Reading, by Milwaukee.

The group included eight pitchers, three outfielders, a shortstop and a catcher.

Friend Rescues Longden

ALBANY, Calif. (AP) — "I'll be seeing that picture in my sleep," said jockey Ray York after rescuing jockey Johnny Longden, knocked out and caught under a fallen horse at Golden Gate Fields Monday.

Longden, 44-year-old English-bred rider, was bringing up I'm Going in the post parade for the second race when the horse wheeled and topped over the outside fence in front of the stands.

The three-time national riding champion lay unconscious at the bottom of a drainage ditch with the horse sprawled on top of him. I'm Going's right rear leg was wedged in the rail.

York, riding Mercenary, leaped to the ground and rushed to the aid of Longden, a close friend. "When I got to him he was out cold," York said later. "I'm Going's left foot was within a half inch of Johnny's head. I held the horse and then when Johnny's left leg suddenly shot out—I guess it was a reflex action—I grabbed it while a spectator held the horse."

"I was praying silently," said Dr. L. J. Cook, a veterinarian, "that the horse would not kick or thrash about. It was plain that if the horse either kicked or thrashed, he would bash in Longden's skull. John had to be freed before the horse was, even if it meant breaking Longden's legs."

York soothed I'm Going, took the reins and pushed the animal's weight away from the stricken jockey. Meantime, he told excited fans to keep away from the terrified horse.

York first cocked the struggling horse's head and quieted him enough to hand the reins to a bystander and grab Longden's leg. Then he and Cook pulled Longden free.

Kip Taylor, Staff Quit OSC Positions

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — LaVerne (Kip) Taylor resigned Monday night as head football coach at Oregon State College saying he was taking the action "in view of apparent increasing pressure in the Oregon State College football program."

Taylor, whose team won only one game in nine starts this year in one of OSC's worst seasons, asked the school's Athletic Board to relieve him on July 1, 1955.

Three assistants, Leonard Younce, Ward Cuff and Hal Moe, submitted their resignations at the same time.

The resignations were forwarded to A. L. Strand, OSC president, who said in a statement they will be presented to the State Board of Higher Education at its Dec. 14 meeting "with my full expectation they will be accepted."

Taylor, former assistant coach at Michigan State, was signed as head coach here in 1949. In five years his teams won 20 games and lost 36.

OSC won the opening game from Idaho this year, then dropped eight straight contests including Saturday's meeting with its traditional rival, Oregon.

Suit Filed Against Major Loops

NEW YORK (AP) — The major leagues and Commissioner Ford Frick had a \$250,000 suit on their hands today and the minor league club owner who filed it promised the majors even more headaches.

The suit, filed by Frank D. Lawrence of the Portsmouth Terrifics of the Class B Piedmont League, charges invasion of territory through broadcasting and televising of big league games.

Frick declined comment on the suit, but Lawrence, who estimated the Piedmont League lost \$150,000 the past year and might not be able to operate next season, had plenty to say in his home.

"There are 83 independent minor league clubs," he said, "and all have been invited to come into this thing. Some still haven't made up their minds yet and that's one of the reasons we decided to file single suits instead of a big, blanket suit as originally planned."

"Mr. Frick will have his hands full very shortly," Mr. Frick thought all this talk about a suit against him and the major league clubs was just talk. Well, Mr. Frick knows different now.

Billy Smith KO's McBride

NEW YORK (AP) — Boardwalk Billy Smith, a ninth round technical knockout winner over Archie McBride, wants to fight heavyweights Nino Valdes or Don Cockell while he waits for Archie Moore to defend his light heavyweight title.

Smith, No. 1 contender in the 175-pound class, dropped McBride three times for 9-counts Monday night at St. Nicholas Arena before referee Mark Conn stopped it. McBride was down twice in the seventh and once in the ninth. He was sagging against the ropes at the end.

Ohio State Continues To Lead AP Football Poll; UCLA Second

Rose Bowl-bound Ohio State, only the second team in Big Ten history ever to win seven straight games in that tough circuit, received a thumping vote of confidence today from 250 sports writers and broadcasters participating in the semifinal Associated Press ranking poll.

The experts, who put Ohio's Buckeyes ahead of equally unbeaten UCLA a week ago by the extra-thin margin of seven points, moved them out nearly 100 points ahead of the UCLA's today.

GATHERED
Ohio State, with 115 first-place votes, piled up a total of 2,239 points on the usual basis of 10 points for each first-place vote, 9 for second, etc. UCLA gathered 85 firsts and 2,162 points for second place, while Oklahoma's Sooners, holding firmly onto third place, polled 31 firsts and 1,953 points.

These three unbeaten teams, each with nine victories, remained well in front as five changes were recorded in the top 10. Notre Dame and Army held the fourth and fifth spots, followed by Navy, Mississippi.

pl. Wisconsin, Baylor and Maryland, in order.

These switches reflected last Saturday's results, with one exception. Navy, which had been a shade behind Mississippi and tied with Southern California for seventh place, advanced to sixth in a week when both teams were idle. Southern California, thumped 34-0 by UCLA, dropped to 17th place.

VACANT
Arkansas and Minnesota fell from the last two places in the first 10 to deep in the second as they lost to Louisiana State and Wisconsin, respectively. Wisconsin, 27-0 winner over Minnesota; Baylor which beat Southern Methodist 33-21, and Maryland, 48-6 winner over George Washington, came up to the vacant spots.
