

Needed Changes In Oregon Laws Face '55 Legislature

SALEM, Ore. — The 1955 Legislature gave Oregon a rewritten version of the state laws, but the 1955 session will have to make hundreds of changes in it to get rid of some screwy things.

Sam Haley, the code reviser, wrote the new law books. Since he was instructed to change only the wording and not the meaning, there still are many odd things about the law.

Haley is submitting 105 pages of recommendations for changes to the new Legislature.

His suggestions deal with laws that are outmoded, unclear, inconsistent, or just plain crazy.

For instance, you can't ride a horse, mule or other animal more than six miles an hour in town. Another gem says that mayors of cities have to ask every kid who's smoking a cigarette where he bought it.

There's a law saying that no bank can give gifts to the Multnomah County treasurer in order to influence him to put the county funds in that bank. Haley wants to know why that doesn't apply to the other 35 county treasurers.

Hospitals are required to report all deaths. There's nothing to say where these deaths should be reported.

And then there's a law preventing public officials from charging for their services and from defrauding the public. However, it doesn't apply to the governor, Supreme Court and members of the Legislature. Haley thinks these officials should be kept honest, too.

Here's an interesting conflict. One law says that when a legislator dies or quits, the county court shall appoint his successor. It's done that way now. But another one says that the governor must call a special election to fill the vacancy.

Man Stricken With Cerebral Palsy Sells Movie Story

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Thanksgiving Day has a special meaning for Samuel James Larsen this year.

Stricken with cerebral palsy, he faced a life as a hopeless cripple. But today he has a thriving career as an author and has sold the original story for one of the biggest movies of the year.

As with all CP victims, Sam Larsen's story begins when he was born; the affliction is the result of a brain injury at birth. Sam was 5 before he was able to take a step. By 9, he says, "I could hardly walk across the room without falling flat on my face."

His condition improved as he grew up and by high school he was able to live a normal life. He even went out for the boxing team. But when he was at Loyola University at Los Angeles, paralysis

seized to creep over his body. At first he had to use a cane. Then crutches. Finally he was forced into a wheelchair.

He managed to get through the university. But the future looked grim. He started writing, finished a number of stories, but had no luck in selling them.

Five years went by. A religious man, he mused one day about the Parable of the Prodigal Son. He took the bare 22 lines from St. Luke and fashioned 60 pages of what might have happened to the Prodigal. He showed the story to his friend Joe Green Jr., son of the movie industry censor.

Green became enthused, did some more work on it and peddled it around at the studios. All of them turned it down except MGM. The studio bought it and poured an estimated four million dollars

Texans Plan Bank Opening

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — They're going to dedicate a new bank building here next week in that modest Texas style.

Among other things, a full symphony orchestra will provide dinner music at a banquet for 4,500.

The Republic National Bank bills itself as the biggest in the Southwest and boasts its new 40-story, 25-million-dollar home as the biggest bank building in the South.

But even for Texas, the hoopla for the dedication of this new building is a bit breathtaking.

The main show starts Sunday with a "press preview," works up to that gigantic dinner Tuesday and then reaches a climax at the official dedication next Wednesday.

In between are assorted cocktail parties and luncheons, with guest lists starting at 1,000 and going on up.

The bank sent out 142,000 engraved invitations for folks to "come see us."

It expects a good majority to show up, including 6,000 to 8,000 stockholders at a special open house. At least 40,000 are expected for the official dedication and police are already trying to figure out what to do with the traffic that's going to be stacked up in the downtown area.

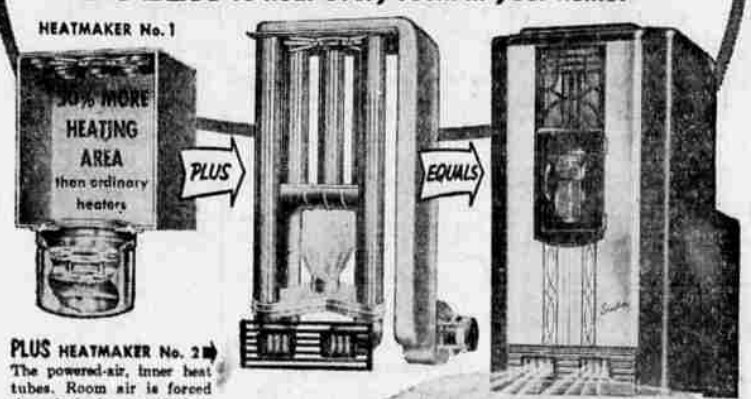
