That — the first Thanksgiving Day was celebrated in December 1621 in Plymouth colony? That — the first Thanksgiving observance lasted for three days? That — the name of the governor who ordered the first Thanksgiving was Governor William Bradford? That — the Wampanoag Indians invited to that first feast brought wild turkey and deer meat? That — it was President George Washington in 1789 who issued the first proclamation for people of this land to give thanks for a new constitution? That — it was President Abraham Lincoln who issued the first national proclamation making Thanksgiving the fourth Thursday in November. That — the first proclamation was issued on the urging of Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale, editor of the Godey's Lady Book who had promoted the idea without success for 30 years? Roosevelt who changed the date to the third Thursday in November to stimulate business during the last depression by lengthening the shopping period between Thanksgiving and Christmas?
