### Spud Promotion Program Begins

Indications that the Klamath-Deschutes Potato Council has started the ball rolling in their potato advertising promotion program is a story appearing in the Oakland Tribune earlier this month. The story, intended to catch the eye of the produce buyer in the Bay area reads in part: "The first advertisement of a select-market advertising merchandising program for Oregon Russet potatoes from the Klamath and Deschutes potato lands of Oregon is scheduled to appear in the Oakland Tribune. While Oregon Russets have, for a number of years, had considerable distribution and sales in this market, this marks the first time that Oregon Russets have been backed by a promotion program of this scope. This advertising will reach 191,920 Tribune families through the rest of November and one week of advertising before Christmas. This will be followed after the first of the year by another advertising push, the exact schedule to be determined."

## Englishman Admits Spy Charges

LONDON (AP)—A Scotland Yard inspector testified Wednesday John Clarence, 27, a British clerk, admitted he spied on U.S. Navy headquarters in London as a voluntary agent of the Soviet Union. At the close of a hearing in magistrate's court Clarence was ordered held for jury trial on two charges of obtaining and recording military information "calculated to be useful to an enemy." Clarence pleaded innocent. The case was brought against the clerk under the rarely invoked official secrets act—the same process followed in the trial and conviction of atom spy Klaus Fuchs. Prosecutor Ian Smith told the court Clarence obtained information about Britain's anti-aircraft defenses while employed as a clerk for a home guard unit in the fall of 1953. Smith said the case came to light when Clarence lost a briefcase containing a document headed "Embassy of the Soviet Union." Chief Inspector Charles Ward of Scotland Yard testified that the British permitted Clarence to take his job with the home guard even though they knew he had volun-

teered his services to the Soviet embassy some time before. He declared Clarence admitted he went to the Soviet consulate here in September 1952 "and offered his services in any capacity."

## Rain, Snow Hits Big Area

Blustery weather was the outlook on Thanksgiving Day for most of the northeastern section of the country. Generally fair to partly cloudy skies prevailed in most other areas although there was some rain and fog in sections of the Pacific coast. More rain and snow fell in northeastern areas, extending from east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio River. The rain areas included the lower Michigan Peninsula and parts of southern New England. Strong winds blew in parts of the wet belt. Light rain fell in western Washington and in the interior of northern California and eastern Washington. Fog covered wide sections of the Pacific coastal states. Visibility was reported at zero at Los Angeles early today and at 1-16th of a mile at Oakland, Calif. Skies were cloudy in the Northern Plains region but clear fair weather was reported in other parts of the country. Temperatures were in the 20s in the Northern Plains and upper Mississippi River Valley and mostly in the 30s from the Central Plains eastward across the Great Lakes region and Ohio River Valley to the Middle and North Atlantic states. Readings were in the 40s over most of the Gulf states and along the Pacific coast.

## U.S. Cool To Chilean Idea

QUITANDINHA, Brazil (AP)—Chile's proposal for a hemisphere bank to finance Latin America's economic development faced an uncertain future at the Inter-American Economic Conference Thursday. The big hitch was U. S. unwillingness to put up the money. Other comparatively affluent American nations also were reported cool to the idea of pooling their foreign reserves to help their underdeveloped sisters, a plan put forward in broad outline day before Wednesday by Chilean Finance Minister Jorge Prat. Mexico was said to be leery of the project and Peru also was not expected to take to it. Cuba reportedly has done such extensive financing of her own sugar economy that she cannot go along with any program of giving aid abroad. The U. S. delegation, which journeyed Thursday to nearby Rio de Janeiro for Thanksgiving festivities at its embassy, has emphasized it has no objection to the Chilean plan if the other nations want it. But Washington's representatives also made clear that President Eisenhower's government will not contribute any funds. The administration feels that the proposed Chilean program can only duplicate work already being done or contemplated by the Export-Import Bank, the International Monetary Fund and other banking and financial institutions. Chile herself was reported agreeable to a delay in action on the proposal.

## Freighter Towed Into Astoria

ASTORIA (AP)—A ship that ran out of fuel several hundred miles at sea reached port safely here Wednesday. The Panamanian freighter, Atlantic Star, was towed to safety by a sister ship, the Atlantic Breeze. The freighter ran out of fuel after encountering a series of storms on a voyage from Japan. The freighter took on fuel at Astoria, then went up the Columbia River to Vancouver, Wash., to load grain for Ireland.

**TAXES** — The Italian government has approved sweeping new taxes on such things as beer, cigarettes and cement. As endorsed by Premier Mario Scelba's Cabinet, they are expected to raise about 21 billion lire (34 million dollars) next year to meet a promised pay raise for civil servants.

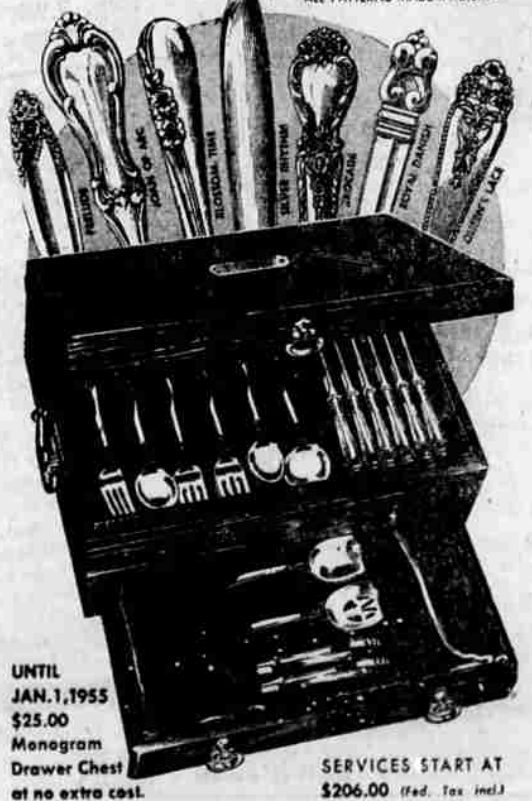
