Storm Blasts Over Japan

TOKYO (AP) — At least five persons were killed, 23 fishing boats sunk, and many crops ruined by hurricane winds that battered seven small islands 100 miles south of Tokyo Sunday.

Fifteen persons were missing. Communications were smashed. The reports said winds up to 100 miles an hour were registered.

Earlier, Kyodo News Service said 30 boats were searching the seas east of central Japan for five persons missing in the wake of the weekend's furious storm.

Churchill Honored By Countrymen

LONDON (AP) — Britons set aside political differences Monday and got into a sentimental mood to salute Winston Churchill on his 80th birthday Tuesday.

He spent a quiet weekend with his family at Chequers, the Prime Minister's official country residence, to rest up for the festivities that will be coupled with the formal opening of a new session of parliament.

The pro-labor Daily Mirror, which for months has been calling Churchill too old to serve as Prime Minister and demanding he retire, said in a birthday tribute "beyond all doubt he is the greatest Englishman of this century."

Sponsors of the Churchill birthday presentation fund disclosed they have received an anonymous donation of 11 Russian rubles. Another donor sent a check for 29,220 farthings—one for each day of Churchill's life, and not forgetting the leap years. A farthing is a quarter of a British penny and 29,220 of them are worth \$85.22.

Tuesday Churchill will be represented with an initial payment on the fund running into at least 100,000 pounds (\$280,000). It is expected he will use the fund, which may finally total 10 times that much, for student scholarships and other philanthropic projects.

Two 90-lb birthday cakes have been baked—one to be cut at a party in the houses of parliament, the other at a family party at 10 Downing Street.

Famed Shakespearean Play Presented On Television

NEW YORK (AP) — Is William Shakespeare for the millions, or more specifically for television's millions of viewers?

Maurice Evans, Judith Anderson, NBC and the sponsors of Hall of Fame tried nobly to prove that he is in a two-hour production of "Macbeth" yesterday.

With "Macbeth" being the shortest of the Bard's tragedies, they were able to present Shakespeare undiluted and unadorned with only minor cuts. The five-act play was the transitions from one scene to divided into two parts, and at times the transitions from one scene to another seemed abrupt and hurried, but on the whole the production was noteworthy considering television's limitations of time and scope.

While Vatican sources emphasized there was no cause for undue alarm, the attitude of the Vatican secretary of state's office was described as "neither too pessimistic nor too optimistic."

The Pontiff is again suffering from hiccups, an ailment that last January and February dangerously sapped his strength. A source close to him said he is having difficulty taking food by mouth.
