

Seed Growers Plan Meeting

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis—Dwindling government-owned seed stocks and prospects for a growing foreign trade are sharpening interest in the annual Oregon Seed Growers' League convention, December 8 to 10, at Portland, according to Secretary Rex Warren, Oregon State College farm crops specialist.

Small 1954 seed crops in this country, Canada and Europe have permitted flow of 50 million pounds of seed since July 1 from Commodity Credit Corporation holdings of slightly more than 100 million pounds.

Main conference speakers scheduled to fan interest in foreign seed trade include W. H. Youngman, USDA economist who recently returned from sifting up market potentials in the Near East. Foreign seed production reports will be made by Stanley Weston, Canadian grower; Ed Geary, Klamath Falls farmer who spent the past year in New Zealand; and Dick Baum, Pendleton, state secretary of the Oregon Wheat League, just back from two months in the Far East.

Proposed changes in the Oregon seed law are up for panel discussion by Frank McKennon, state department of agriculture; Wallace Rice, Grants Pass warehouse operator; Mrs. Louisa Jensen, head of Oregon State College seed testing laboratory; and George Royce, Timber seed grower.

Los Angeles Smog Lifting

LOS ANGELES.—A heavy siege of fog in southern California, with strong doses of smog added in the Los Angeles area, appears to be lifting.

Visibility improved last night after the fog had slowed highway, sea and air traffic for five days. The Weather Bureau reported that clearing weather could be expected today, although low clouds were predicted for the morning hours.

Yesterday morning motorists on Los Angeles streets kept headlights burning as the fog cut visibility to less than a block. But in the afternoon the fog began to thin out and in many sections visibility was not impaired.

Los Angeles International Airport resumed operations early yesterday after being closed down during the night hours.

Police reported that from Wednesday night until last night there were more than 2,000 traffic accidents in Los Angeles County, most of them blamed on the fog. Many of them were of a minor nature but approximately 300 persons were listed as injured.

J. C. Penney Pay Planned

NEW YORK — J. C. Penney Company, nationwide department store organization, announced today that its directors have authorized a special year-end payment for more than 50,000 associates in the company's 1,639 stores, offices and warehouses throughout the United States.

The payment will be an amount equal to two weeks' pay for all fulltime associates who have been employed for the full year 1954, and proportionate amounts for extra and part-time associates, and those employed less than a year. All Penney's associates will share in the payment except management staff members whose earnings are determined largely by the company's longstanding profit-sharing plan. It will be made December 15.

In a letter to the firm's associates, A. W. Hughes, president, said the payment was based upon the company's results for 1954. "We are particularly happy to be able to make this payment as a result of what has been accomplished this past year," he said. "The possibility of future payments of course will continue to depend upon year to year results."

The payment is in addition to regular company provisions for associates' benefits, including sick benefit, gratuity, death and dismemberment benefit, thrift and profit sharing retirement fund plans, discounts on company purchases and others.

administered the poison into the food and drink of spouses from four states.

County Atty. J. Howard Edmondson said a murder charge will be filed today against the 49-year-old plumpish, jovial widow for the Oct. 6 death of Samuel Doss, 58, of Tulsa.

Edmondson said the other poisoned husbands and the dates they died are: Frank Harrelson; Jacksonville, Ala., 1945; Harley Lanning, Lexington, N.C., 1952; Richard L. Morton, 64, Emporia, Kan., May 19, 1953.

The prosecutor, with city officers and Kansas and Oklahoma agents, has questioned the woman since her arrest Friday night and said investigations into the deaths of four of her relatives probably will be undertaken.

RELATIVES
He identified the relatives, whom he said succumbed under strange circumstances, as Mrs. Doss' mother, two sisters and a step-grandson.

After making her confession, Edmondson related, Mrs. Doss declared, "My conscience is clear." He said it was a comment she uttered after each formal statement.

The only surviving husband is Charley Bragg, of Alabama City, Ala. Edmondson said Mrs. Doss told him the marriage to Bragg in 1921 produced four daughters, two now living. They were divorced in 1923.

County Investigator W. A. Lang said Mrs. Doss gave the following reasons for poisoning her spouses: She poisoned Lanning by doping his food. She said she poisoned him on a Tuesday or a Wednesday and that he died the following Friday.

She said she had been jealous of Lanning because he was popular with the women. That was the same reason she gave for placing the rodent killer in the coffee of Morton, a native of Okmulgee, Okla., and of Indian descent. She claimed Harrelson beat her so she poured liquid poison into his jug of corn whiskey.

Edmondson said she denied any connection with the deaths of her sisters, her mother or Harrelson's 21-year-old grandson, who preceded Harrelson in death by two months.

Mrs. Doss permitted an inter-

ruption of her interrogation yesterday long enough to make an appearance for television cameras. She sat through a filmed interview at which only questions from authorities were permitted. Officers said before the filming, she insisted on prettifying herself for the occasion. She smiled and seemed to enjoy herself during the brief questioning.

QUOTED
She was quoted as saying she poured "a lot of poison on his prunes." After eating them he went to the hospital for 23 days. "He sure did like prunes," she said. "I fixed a whole box and he ate them all."
