Algae Study To Be Made

Harry Kenyon Phinney, Ph.D., associate professor of botany at Oregon State College, has been invited to meet with representatives of the chamber of commerce, city and county officials and other interested persons Friday, December 3, to discuss Upper Klamath Lake and its proficiency of algae.

Professor Phinney is recognized as one of three water algae authorities in the United States. The others are located at University of Chicago and at Washington, D.C.

The West Coast algae authority has expressed his willingness to cooperate with local bodies interested in promoting a concentrated scientific study of Klamath's aquatic farm.

The Friday conference was arranged following a meeting of local interested persons early in October at which Ken McLeod, Klamath naturalist, reported on his initial study of the lake, (done at the request of the city and county) and recommended that Professor Phinney be invited to Klamath Falls.

The conference is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. in the chamber of commerce office.

Murderer Given Death Sentence

NEW YORK (AP)—John F. Roche, 27, who came out of a "dead end" background to confess five slayings, was sentenced Tuesday to die in the Sing Sing prison electric chair.

His attorneys said they would appeal.

Roche was tried specifically for a crime that shocked the city, the rape-slaying of Dorothy Westwater, 14, on her way to school last June 2.

An all-male jury on Nov. 9 found Roche guilty of first degree murder and made no recommendation of mercy. The death sentence pronounced by General Sessions Judge Jonah J. Goldstein was mandatory.
