Oregon Wheat Men To Meet

PORTLAND — The Oregon Wheat Growers League's annual meeting will have advance registration here Wednesday with committee meetings the next day and the general session starting Friday.

One of the talks of special interest is expected to be that on the program of the Foreign Agriculture Service given by Ed Bell, the Oregon Wheat Commission administrator-on-leave. Robert B. Taylor, Adams rancher, becomes acting administrator Dec. 1 under appointment made at a commission meeting early this month.

Other talks Friday will be by John Locke, Seattle, president of Fisher Flouring Mills, on Boulgour wheat in foreign markets; Kenneth Kendrick, Stratford, Texas, president of the National Assn. of Wheat Growers, on government subsidies; Walter Johnson, Portland, on commodity stabilization activities in the Northwest.

At the Friday banquet, R. K. Baum, the league's executive secretary who has been in the Far East for several months, will report on promotional efforts there.

Saturday's program will be devoted largely to committee reports.

Peers Hear Queen Declare For Close Ties With U.S.

LONDON — Queen Elizabeth II opened the new session of Parliament today with a declaration that world survival depends on the continued intimate association of Britain and the United States.

The young monarch delivered her speech from the throne in the red and gold splendor of the House of Lords chamber. She spoke the words prepared for her in accordance with parliamentary tradition by Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill, today celebrating his 80th birthday.

Robed peers heard the Queen say:

"My government attaches the highest importance to maintaining and strengthening close and friendly relations with the United States of America. It is upon this intimate association that world survival depends."

She said that in the session ahead, a short meeting ending Dec. 23, her ministers "will strive unflinchingly to promote the well-being of my people and the peace of the world."

"My government is convinced a strong and united commonwealth can take a leading part in the councils of nations," she declared.

The Queen's speech represents the basic policy Churchill's Conservative government will follow. During the next few days it will be analyzed and debated in parliament.

Archery Shoot To Be Held

Klamath Sportsmen's Association is planning its annual archery turkey shoot for Sunday, December 5, at the clubhouse. Starting time will be 10 a.m.

A novelty feature on the program this year will be balloons for targets at long range and another event will include moving helium-filled balloons.

Squads will be arranged for youngsters as well as adults.

The association asks that those having light bows from 20 to 30 pound pull which they will loan for the day, to bring them along for the beginners. Some bows are available at the club. Arrows will be sold at the clubhouse.

Hot coffee and doughnuts will be available.

The road to the club has not been graveled but freezing weather or snow will not impede travel. In the event of rain, however, the shoot will be moved to the OTI indoor rifle range where it was held last year. Some 30 archers participated in that event.

In addition to turkeys and chickens, sporting goods items will be put up for the shoot.

The club is about one-half mile from Carl Frei's store or the 57 Trailer Camp. Markers to the club are being put up this week.

Former Klamath Resident Dies

Word was received here Monday afternoon of the death at Superior, Wisconsin, of W. R. Minton who has been superintendent for the Great Northern here from July 1, 1943 to January 1, 1948. He was about 64. Death resulted from a heart attack.

Mr. and Mrs. Minton and their daughter, who had been graduated from KUHS in 1944, moved to Whitefish, Montana, and then to Wisconsin.

In addition to his widow and daughter, a son survives.

Woman Blocks Robbery Try

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — A waitress refused to be awed when a holdup man entered a cafe and demanded money Monday night. She handed over a roll of nickels and grabbed the man's gun in return.

Mrs. Claire Irene Ray, 24, then found the weapon was only a toy cap pistol. The bandit fled.

Later patrolman Joe Soares spotted a man meeting the description given by Mrs. Ray. He arrested David Ott, 25, an unemployed welder of Ocean Park, Calif., and booked him on suspicion of robbery. Soares reported Ott had \$3.88 in nickels and pennies and 2,000 rounds of ammunition—40 rolls of caps.

Ott was also booked on suspicion of another robbery attempt that failed earlier in the evening. Theater cashier Nancy Pollock, 16, said a man pointed a gun at her. He fled when she told him, "Just a minute, here comes the manager."

Road Race Win Announced Wrong

JUAREZ, Mexico (AP)—Lincoln won first and second places in the big stock car division of the Pan-American Road Race, with a Cadillac third. The race ended Nov. 22. The first Associated Press dispatch on the finish incorrectly stated that a Cadillac was first in the division.

Ray Crawford of Pasadena, Calif., cashed in \$17,500 by winning the big stock car division in his Lincoln. His unofficial elapsed time was 20:49.19. Chuck Stevenson's record, set last year, also in a Lincoln, is 20:31.32.

Walt Faulkner of Long Beach, Calif., in a Lincoln, placed second in the division, with Keith Andrews of Colorado Springs, Colo., third in a Cadillac.

Andrews won the final lap of the race, which gave rise to the erroneous impression that he had also won the entire race.
