# Dulles Announces Foreign Policy To Deal With China

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration today sought measures short of "war action" to counter "provocative" acts by the Chinese Communists.

The policy line was laid down by Secretary of State Dulles in a speech at Chicago last night. Dulles barred for the present any naval and air blockade of Red China.

At the same time he called for vigilance in dealings with Russia. He said "coexistence"—Moscow's currently proclaimed foreign policy line—is a "tricky word" in the absence of any renunciation of international communism's "effort to rule the world by methods of force, intimidation and fraud."

Dulles gave a far-ranging report on U.S. foreign policy before a national 4-H Club congress in Chicago last night. Before returning to the capital shortly afterward, he repeated it for a nationwide TV-radio hookup.

He did not specify what the State Department planned to do about 13 Americans sentenced to prison in Red China on spy charges this country has branded as false. Informants indicated the United States might ask Russia to intervene with Red China, but it was expected main action would be concentrated on mobilizing world opinion against the sentencing.

Dulles apparently was referring to the 13 in his speech, and to Red China's threats against Formosa, when he said that while the Russians have recently "talked more softly," the Chinese Communists have talked and acted with increasing violence.

"Our nation," he said, "will react, and react vigorously, in the protection of our citizens, but without allowing ourselves to be provoked into action which would be a violation of our international obligations and which would impair the alliance of the free nations."

He departed from his prepared text to insert the phrase about protecting U.S. citizens. He said perhaps international communism was trying in a new way to divide

the free nations, remarking: "They seek to be soothing in Europe, they are provocative in Asia."

The United States, he said, is committed by the U.N. Charter to try to settle international disputes by peaceful means.

"Therefore," he said, "our first duty is to exhaust peaceful means of sustaining our international rights and those of our citizens, rather than now resorting to war action such as a naval and air blockade of Red China."

He noted the existence of "a vast Russian military establishment" and said that safety from attacks lies in the maintenance of an effective defense coupled with "retaliatory power."

"We believe," he said, "that the greatest contribution we can make to peace is to be ready to fight, if need be, and to have the resources and the allies to assure that an aggressor would surely be defeated."

"That does not mean being truculent or provocative or militaristic. It does mean seeking peace not only with the heart, but also with the mind."

He said that the continental defense system now building "should enable us to knock down a very high percentage of any Red bombers engaged in hostile missions against the United States."

Furthermore, he said, the U.S. Strategic Air Command now could retaliate against the Soviet Union with "damage far in excess of that which Red planes could inflict upon the United States."

Perhaps having in mind the critical reaction of Allied nations when he declared a policy of "massive retaliation" early this year, he said that the maintenance of a capacity to strike back at an aggressor does not mean that any local war would automatically be converted into a general war "with atomic bombs being dropped all over the map."

Nor does it mean, he said, that the aggressor would have to be totally destroyed. What it does mean is an ability to "inflict punishing damage," he said.

He said the danger from Communist subversion is particularly great in Asia and Africa, and the situation in the Indo-chinese state of Viet Nam—recently partitioned

by the Geneva peace agreement—is "precarious." He said one of the measures needed to combat subversion in these areas is a program for financing economic development.

## Texans Plan Huge Party

DALLAS, Tex., (AP)—Much of Dallas was agog today over formal dedication tomorrow of the city's new 40-story Republic National Bank Building, tallest in these parts.

About 4,800 visiting "celebrities," the bank's press agents said, would be in town for Texas' biggest shindig since Glenn McCarthy opened his swank Shamrock Hotel in Houston.

Some of the same old cast from the Shamrock wingding was expected back, even Bob Hope, who was almost sure to have a crack about chinking on 20-dollar gold pieces.

Dessert at the dinner tonight in the huge Fair Park Automobile Building will be gold-colored ice cream in replica of the 20-dollar piece. Drinks at three bars, stretching a city block, will be on the house.

At the city's airport, "so many celebrities were arriving at one time that no one could count them all," a reporter said.

The big building, costing 25 million dollars, was plagued during construction by 11 destructive fires with estimated damage of about a half million. Recently, since completion, a water main broke on the 17th floor and flooded five stories.

Prededication viewers of the aluminum-sheathed giant compared it with New York's United Nations Building and with Washington's famed Pentagon.

## Naguib Granted Monthly Subsidy

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—The Egyptian government will grant former President Gen. Mohamed Naguib a monthly subsidy of \$500 and the use of three cars, an official source said last night.

However, Naguib will continue to live at Merg, the suburban house where he has been kept under heavy guard since the revolutionary regime deposed him Nov. 14. The government has charged him with plotting with the Muslim Brotherhood to upset the government.
