**Prized Indian Relic Purchased**  
Mrs. Edith Rutenic McLeod, Klamath Falls collector, found a prize item in a recent collection of Indian baskets bought from Carl Clausen of Delaware Water Gap, Pennsylvania.  
The basket, apparently made by Toby Riddle, the Winema of Modoc Indian War, was included in the shipment of some 40 other baskets recently received by Mrs. McLeod. It was tagged with Mrs. Riddle's name and is probably between 50 and 80 years old. It is excellently preserved and was made from tules and cattails.  
Thousands of baskets and other Indian artifacts have been taken from Oregon to be sold elsewhere and Mrs. McLeod considers it a coincidence that one made by Winema found its way back to the country where she was raised.  
Mrs. McLeod is the curator of the new Klamath County Museum.

**Bus Workers To Purchase System**  
TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—Bus workers in this city of 145,000 are going to buy out the privately owned system in a two-million-dollar deal.  
Officials of the Tacoma Transit Co. and the AFL Motor Coach Employees Union announced yesterday a plan calling for union members to buy the firm's stock through a payroll deduction plan and to retain the present company officials.  
The company has 350 employees.

# TV Abuses Studied At Annual Meet

NEW YORK (AP)—Ever have the sound on your TV set adjusted nicely for the program only to be almost blasted out of your chair by the commercial? Ever feel sometimes that there are only brief interruptions of the commercials for entertainment?  
Then you have company. Those are among the abuses singled out by Chairman Deems Taylor and fellow judges of the Sylvania Television Awards Committee in their annual report last night.  
The committee gave TV credit for "a definite upward swing in the quality of programs" in the past year but added that "unfortunately, television retains some less commendable features."  
"There still is too much time and energy devoted to trite, banal and downright silly concoctions," it continued. "Many shows, in aiming at the widest possible audience, altogether miss the target of true entertainment values."  
Among the specifics cited against TV was the "pitchman technique" in which "announcers manage to turn a purported program into one long, repetitious commercial."  
The committee also deplored "putting pressure on parents... through the children" and the fact

that "youngsters are taught to chant singing commercials much the way they once learned nursery rhymes."  
And on many programs shown at hours when children are watching, it said, "specific details of crime and clever criminal techniques are graphically shown" but "the actual punishment is left to the viewers' imagination." At no time, the committee added, "do the impressive youngsters learn what it is like to spend a large portion of one's life in prison."  
Warned the committee: "Although we deplore censorship in any form, we cannot but feel that television, by failing to cope with its own problems, is providing potent ammunition to those who are anxious to impose restrictions upon it."
