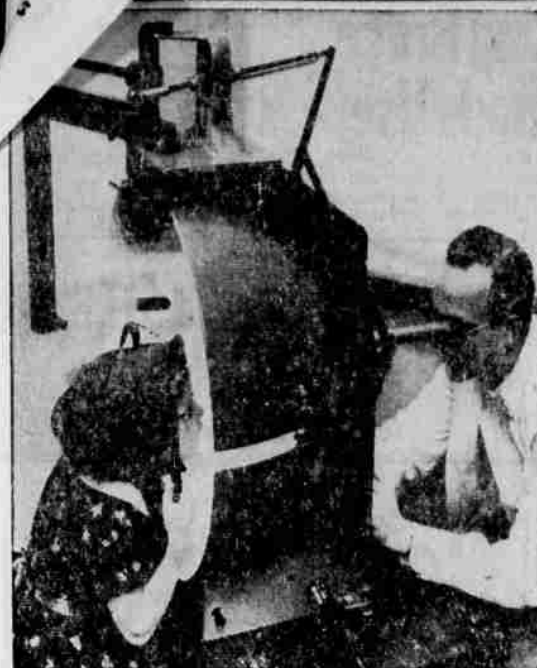

Bond, clinic director. The Oregon State Elks Association recently purchased the \$1200 machine for the clinic which aids visually handicapped children.

Oregon Elks Purchase Eye Machine For Medical Use

The Oregon State Elks Association has purchased a \$1,200 machine for the eye department of the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland which is revolutionizing the testing of side vision among visually handicapped children.

With this latest contribution, Oregon's 41 Elks lodges through their state association have spent approximately \$85,000 in support of the Children's Eye Clinic at the medical school.

This new machine, manufactured in Switzerland and called the Goldman perimeter, is believed to be the only one in the West. The perimeter is so new that it still is considered in the experimental stage.

Testing of side vision no longer is much of a problem for the Children's Eye clinic because of the speedy, accurate perimeter, said Dr. John L. Bond, clinic director.

Side vision is one of two types of vision that a person has. The other is central vision. You use central vision, which is sharp vision, when you read, write and look directly ahead, explained Dr. Bond. The eye chart is a common test of central vision.

Where central vision has a range of only a few degrees, side vision has a field of 180 degrees and some persons have a wider range than that. Side vision, although not as sharp as central vision, is just as important when you begin moving about. Without side vision, you would bump into things when attempting to pass by them and you would be blind at night.

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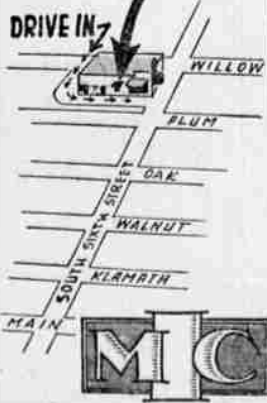
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
