Phone System To Be Changed

WEED — Saturday, December 4 at 11:01 p.m. all telephone numbers in Weed will change to the new telephone numbering plan. Weed's new numbers will have the prefix Yellowstone 8. This new numbering will bring Weed into the nation-wide numbering plan being established — one exchange at a time — throughout California.

The new numbers with the prefix will facilitate direct dialing of long distance calls to Weed by long distance operators in many parts of the country, in that they will be able to dial Weed direct from their offices.

As a preview of the event, F. M. Dill, Pacific Telephone and Telegraph manager, Yreka, has arranged for several days of public telephone demonstrations in Weed. The demonstrations began Wednesday December 1 and will continue through Saturday December 4. Hours are from 4 p.m. until 9 p.m. each day. Arrangements have been made to show the exhibits and demonstrations to school children in the mornings and early afternoon.

The demonstrations and exhibits are being staged at 127 Main Street in Weed.

There are approximately 900 telephones in Weed. Conversion to the dialing system commenced in Weed February 5, 1941.

An eight man crew with the Western Electric Company, have been in Weed for about three months making the necessary central office conversions.

New directories were mailed out in Weed this week. This year's cover of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph book, carries a picture of Shasta Dam with Mount Shasta in the background. The book covers the area of Shasta, Siskiyou and Trinity counties in northern California.
