ence to Karr being threatened by Pearson was made. Other prosecution witnesses heard by the jury included Glenn Erick, brother of the homicide victim; State Policeman William Roach, who arrested Pearson; and Police Chief Lewis Jones of Clifton.

Glenn Erick gave a dramatic account of the shooting of his brother. "It happened in a matter of seconds," he said. "Gene was standing on the porch. He was leaning against the wall of the house and talking to Mrs. Pearson. Pearson took a 30-30 rifle from a parked car and as he levered a cartridge into the chamber, he was walking toward the house. He said: 'I might get me a couple of bucks tonight. Then the shot came and I saw Gene fall to the floor of the porch. At the time Pearson was about five feet from Gene.'"

State Policeman Roach described an investigation at the scene of the shooting and how he went to a private residence in Clifton where he found Pearson. He said the defendant was calm and offered no resistance.

Police Chief Jones also participated in the investigation of the shooting. He described the arrest of Pearson at the Johnny Copeland home in Clifton. He quoted Pearson as saying: "You better look out, — you're going to get stuck on this deal."

It is expected that District Attorney Frank Alderson will complete the state's case late Friday.

Logging, Lumber Industry Show Largest Job Decrease

Total unemployment in this area at the end of November, 1954, was only slightly higher than the same period in 1953, but 27 per cent above the November, 1952, figures, according to Guy Barker, manager of the Klamath Falls office of Oregon State Employment Service.

Weather will be the determining factor in how much unemployment we have in this industry, according to Barker.

Retail trade and service employment show the usual seasonal decline during December except some additional pre-Christmas hiring in retail trade.

Work applications on file for those unemployed and seeking jobs totaled 1185 at the end of November. Of this number, 322 were added during the month. Only 350 of the total number were women. The largest number of men represented the logging and lumber trades.

Men and women in almost every trade are to be found in this file Barker said, and are available for work on call by the employment office or their union hiring hall. Many of these prospective workers are not drawing unemployment benefits.

Although December and January employment in the area is expected to follow last year's pattern closely, there should be a much quicker recovery shown during early spring if weather permits starting of new projects. During the 1954 the highest week of unemployment was reached the first part of March.

After a relatively warm night, motorists were promised a respite from use of chains in this area on nearly all of the highways, according to word from the Klamath Falls office of Oregon State Motor Association.

Temperature at 6 a.m. today was 32 degrees on the Willamette Pass. Skies were overcast. Pavement was bare except for packed snow at the junction of highways 68 and 97.

There was packed snow and ice at Chemul.

To the south, it was reported foggy from Klamath Falls to Weed and icy between Madoced and Mt. Hebron. No chains were required this morning.

On Highway 66 to Lakeview, official thermometers registered 27 degrees at 8 a.m. today. Clouds were breaking up. Motorists were warned of spots of ice and snow on the highway.

Ground fog lay on the Greensprings. The highway is covered with well-sanded, packed snow. No chains were required this morning.

Two inches of new snow were reported by the ranger station at Crater Lake National Park. Total on the ground is 18 inches, several inches short of the amount necessary for good skiing. Rocks protruding through the snow make skiing dangerous at this level, rangers stated.

Temperature at the rangers' headquarters was 23 degrees at 8 a.m. today. Minimum Thursday was 20 degrees; maximum 30.

The warming hit will be open this weekend.

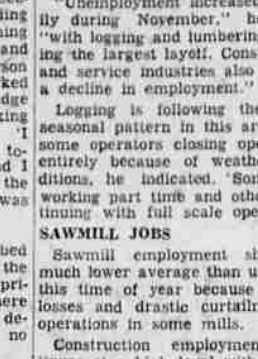
