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Wheat Growers Hear Expert

PORTLAND (AP)—A new surplus agriculture disposal program will permit U. S. growers to sell 30 to 40 million more bushels of wheat and flour to the Far East next year, Richard K. Baum told the Oregon Wheat League Friday.

Baum, executive secretary of the organization, recently returned from a two-month trade mission to Southeast Asia.

He said the additional sales would be made possible by trade agreements which permit the United States to accept foreign currency for surplus food. This currency can be used in part to promote consumption of U. S. foods in foreign countries, he said.

A new product which should make wheat more palatable to Far Eastern tastes, was described by John L. Locke of Seattle, president of the Fisher Flouring Mills Co.

The product, which is similar to food used in ancient times, is made of wheat which is washed, soaked, given a special treatment to gelatinize the starch, then dried into cakes. One pound, which can be baked in 12 minutes, makes 20 servings.

Enactment of a two-price parity plan should be the major goal of the league for the coming year, Morris Wilson of Mayville, president of the organization, reported.

Walter Johnson, director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture commodity stabilization office here, reported that storage facilities for the coming year probably will be adequate. He said that wheat stored in Pacific Northwest reserve merchant ships is in good condition.

Kenneth Kendrick of Stratford, Texas, president of the National Assn. of Wheat Growers, criticized the present flexible price support program and said that Midwest growers now favor the domestic parity program for wheat which is advocated by the league.

Rancher Saves Two Hunters

MILNER, Idaho, (AP)—Two duck hunters from Eden, Idaho, owed their lives today to a 23-year-old rancher who roped them with a lariat and hauled them for a reservoir as mud sucked around their necks.

Mr. and Mrs. Goss Garden and Walt Gooding, all in their 30s, became stuck in the ooze early yesterday after their untired boat capsized on the lake behind Milner Dam.

Gooding worked himself free, but the Gordons were up to their necks before two other duck hunters, hearing their screams, had summoned Edwin Bench from his nearby ranch.

Racing across the dam on horse back, Bench threw a rope to Mr. Gordon. It settled over her head. He dismounted and hauled her to safety.

Meanwhile Gordon, after more than an hour of struggling, was too groggy to respond. So Bench tossed a pole on the mud and inched forward, placing the noose around his body.

Bench and the two other hunters hauled Gordon to safety. Gordon and his wife were taken to a hospital in Burley, Idaho.

Judge Awards Support To Wife

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—A judge yesterday granted screen actor Victor Mature's estranged wife Dorothy \$1,200 a month temporary alimony pending trial of her divorce suit.

Mature, 41, and the former Dorothy Berry of Pasadena, 35, separated last Aug. 31. They were married in 1948.

Actor's Mother Awarded Support

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—An agreement giving his mother \$400 monthly support and other financial help has been signed by actor Van Johnson, the mother's attorney says.

Harold R. Aarons, representing Mrs. Loretta Neuman, said yesterday the agreement was approved by Superior Judge Phil Richards. It specifies that the movie star must pay \$2,417 in back bills incurred by his mother and pay premiums on a \$20,000 insurance policy in which he is beneficiary.

A month ago Mrs. Neuman sued her son for support.

Judge Holman Speaks To AA

Circuit Judge Ralph M. Holman told an Alcoholics Anonymous meeting here Friday night that he would favor a return to prohibition, if widespread corruption would not follow in its wake.

The judge's views are contrary to the principles of AA which believe that persons who have no drinking problem should not be deprived of alcoholic beverages.

"From my experience on the bench," Judge Holman said, "I am convinced that one out of every 20 persons is an alcoholic. I also believe there are alcoholics who have never taken a drink. Persons of a sensitive and highly emotional makeup become alcoholics."

On the subject of prohibition, Judge Holman added:

One of the big arguments against eliminating sale of liquor, is that why should many be deprived of pleasure for the benefit of a few?

"From the misery and trouble I have seen come to persons suffering from uncontrolled drinking, I would like to see alcohol put in the category of many other drugs and sold only on a doctor's prescription."

Gunmen Hold Up Jewelry Store

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two gunmen held up a downtown jewelry store Saturday and escaped with an estimated \$100,000 in gems after binding five store employees with picture-frame wire.

Police said the men, brandishing pistols, scooped the jewels into an overnight case and rifled the safe. Only a small amount of cash was reported taken.

NEW BOOKS ON THE DESK

On my desk this week I find many interesting new books. Among them, Martha Martin's "Home on the Bear's Domain," published a few years ago. Those who read that most gripping story of a woman's adventures in Alaska will look forward to this new book. The new book continues the experiences of her life in the north country.

Another new book is Alben W. Barkley's "That Reminds Me." This autobiography of our former vice president is almost like hearing him talk. Mr. Barkley started his national career at the time of Woodrow Wilson, and now after 40 years he is still "going strong."

The next book I pick up is a book published some years ago and is, "Sailors Knots" by Cyrus Lawrence Day. It will certainly tell you how to tie any kind of knot.

Another book is one written anonymously and the title is, "A Woman in Berlin." This is a diary of a young woman who lived in Germany at the time the Russians came to the city. Even survival was difficult, and it is all vividly described.

Next, I pick two light fiction books, "Beating Wings" by Sara Jenkins, and "The Measure of the Years," by Alice Ross Colver. These will both be good books to read when you are tired, and want to read something restful.

Carl Sandburg's new one-volume "Abraham Lincoln" is certainly worth reading. It was formerly published in six volumes.

There are two new books on MacArthur: Major General Charles A. Willoughby's "MacArthur 1941-1951," and "The Untold Story of Douglas MacArthur."

TOKYO (AP)—Japan's opposition parties agreed today to vote Tuesday on a motion of nonconfidence in Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida's government.

Yoshida served notice that if the motion passes he will dissolve the Diet and plunge the nation into new elections rather than resign.

The opposition — two Socialist parties and the Conservative Democratic party — has enough votes to pass the motion against the Conservative Liberal party government of Yoshida.
