New Power Source Eyed

SPOKANE (AP) — Idaho's Gov. Len Jordan predicted Friday that all of the Pacific Northwest's feasible hydroelectric power sites will have been developed by 1975 and that by 1985 fuel-fired plants will be generating half of the area's electric power.

Jordan, in a speech before a meeting of the Northwest Mining Assn., said declining costs will mean a big boost in the use of thermal power plants, those plants which use heat in the production of electric energy.

"This means," Jordan told the association, "that we should develop the best dams first, because sooner or later we will encounter the competition of thermal development of electricity."

Jordan said the Northwest's hydroelectric potential developed to full capacity would yield about 45 to 50 million kilowatts, as compared to the 7 million now being developed. He said, however, that engineers predict the ultimate development will be about 33 million kilowatts.

Other speakers told the association the demand for metals and minerals should continue good in 1955 with prices ranging slightly higher.

Portland TV Grant Awarded

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission Friday re-affirmed its grant for a channel 12 television station at Portland, Ore., to Oregon Television, Inc.

The FCC refused a request from Columbia Empire Telecasters, Inc. that it reconsider the Oregon Television grant, Northwest Television Broadcasting Co. also contested unsuccessfully for the channel.

Meantime at Portland, Henry A. White, president, said Oregon Television hoped to begin broadcasting by early March. He said the firm had ordered \$400,000 worth of equipment and expects delivery within 30 days.

The new station, which will have the call letters KFOR, will be the third in Portland. Already operating are KPTV, a UHF station, and KOIN-TV, on a VHF channel.

Liberace Signs For Huge Salary

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Liberace is going to play the piano at \$50,000 a week in Las Vegas—the highest salary yet paid an entertainer in the Nevada gambling resort.

He signed last Friday to open the new Riviera Hotel in Las Vegas next April.

A hotel spokesman said: "We figured Liberace is the greatest name in show business today and we figured he's the performer who'll get us off the ground. Besides, his brother George is included in the price."

Meteorite Bids Reported

SYLACAUGA, Ala. (AP) — At least 75 bids for a meteorite which struck an Alabama housewife have been received by the woman's husband, with the mails still bringing additional offers.

Huel Love, attorney for Hewlett Hodges, said that apparently the most satisfactory offer so far received came from the Evansville Public Museum, Evansville, Ind. He declined to say what the museum offered, but said that Hodges was assured an amount in excess of \$5,000.

Hodges had declared that the nine-pound meteorite which struck his wife last Tuesday when it crashed through the roof of their home would be sold to the highest bidder. Offers range from \$4 a pound up.

Mrs. Hodges is still confined to a Sylacauga hospital, where she is recovering from bruises and nervous strain.

Radio Strike Meetings Held

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Negotiations resumed Saturday between shipowners and the striking American Radio Assn. in an effort to resolve a labor dispute that could freeze Pacific Coast shipping.

AFA President William Steinberg charged that the shipowners "don't want an agreement" after Friday's fruitless four-hour meeting. J. Paul St. Sure, president of the shipowners' Pacific Maritime Assn. refused to comment.

The radio operators walked out Thursday after the PMA announced its contract with the AFA "doesn't exist."

The radio men had demanded overtime pay when vessels in port are moved, as provided in a contract negotiated last June. St. Sure had told the union that since the agreement was never ratified by the PMA, it was not binding.

Although few vessels have thus far been affected by the walkout, the tieup would become widespread when the approximately 170 ships operated by PMA member companies reach port.

CHARGE

TOKYO (AP) — Peiping Radio charged Saturday the United States "is trying to use the United Nations as an instrument for continuing aggression in Korea and aggravating tension in Asia."

Peiping, quoting the Communist newspaper Ta Kung Pao in Tientsin, made the charge in attacking the latest U.N. discussions aimed at settling the Korean problem.

Solon Predicts Knowland's Role

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Millikin (R-Colo.) said Saturday he is confident Sen. Knowland of California will continue as Senate Republican leader despite a sharp division over condemnation of Sen. McCarthy's conduct.

Among GOP senators, 22 voted for condemnation and 22 against. McCarthy (Ind-Ore) made the final tally 67-22 in favor of rebuking the Wisconsin Republican.

Knowland was one of the 22 Republicans opposing condemnation. Referring to the possible effect of the McCarthy debate on Knowland's position as party leader, Chairman Millikin of the GOP Senate Conference said in an interview:

"I feel certain he will be retained. I do not believe there will be a permanent division in the Republican organization of the Senate."

Several others expressed the same view.

WOOL

TOKYO (AP) — Kyodo News Service said Saturday Japanese trading companies are trying to work a deal to buy Kashmir wool from Russia, process it in Japan, and then export it to the United States. It could not be learned immediately whether the U.S. government would permit import of such wool.

They were arrested in a roundup of Brotherhood members after Nasser escaped an assassin's bullets at Alexandria Oct. 26.

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BULLETIN

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United States called on the U.N. Saturday for urgent action on behalf of 11 American fliers imprisoned by Red China as alleged spies.

The formal request was made by chief U.S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. in a letter to Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld.

Lodge asked that the question be placed on the agenda of the 60-nation General Assembly as a new item of business under the heading: "Complaint of detention and imprisonment of United Nations military personnel in violation of the Korean Armistice agreement."

Forest Area Hearing Held

EUGENE (AP) — The U. S. Forest Service Friday night urged public support of a proposal to reduce the Three Sisters wilderness area on the crest of the cascade by 50,000 acres.

Public hearings on the proposal—which also calls for creating new wild areas at Mt. Jefferson and Diamond Peak—will be held soon.

The Three Sisters area is a 290,000-acre track in the Willamette National Forest 80 miles east of here.

Also urging public support of the plan were spokesmen for private forestry concerns, including Gus Arneson of the Columbia Sealing Bureau of Portland. They said it would open up the 50,000 acres to logging.

Don Allen, president of the state Isaac Walton League, said his organization would like to see additional studies made on the proposal.

Myron Stahl, a representative of the Western Federation of Outdoor Clubs, opposed the plan, saying the wilderness area should be conserved for recreation.

Forest Service speakers included John Smith, fire control officer for the Willamette National Forest.

Career Of Veteran Oregon Tuberculosis Worker Told

Monday, December 6, will be observed by many clubs and women's groups in Oregon as Sadie Orr Dunbar Health Day. The date was set by proclamation of Douglas McKay, then Governor of Oregon, in 1951 when the first Monday in December was designated to honor Mrs. Dunbar of Portland.

It is particularly fitting at this time when Christmas seals are distributed to give a brief review of her life work, so closely aligned with the milestones in the history of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health Association, according to Mrs. Eric Majors, executive secretary of the Klamath County organization.

From 1915 until 1953, Mrs. Dunbar was executive secretary of the Oregon Association and directed its never-ending fight against tuberculosis.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Dunbar the Oregon Association has created national history through its accomplishments. With the state-wide introduction of the Christmas Seal sale, Mrs. Dunbar's organizational ability came to the front. Probably no other man or woman in the state knows health, social and economic conditions in all the 36 counties as she knows them. In the pioneer days of the association she drove to every county in the state over bad roads by stage, farm wagon or traveled on foot if necessary. Her work is considered an epic in the history of social service in Oregon.

Public health nursing in Oregon owes its life to her. She has served as a public health worker visiting every town and hamlet in Oregon preaching the gospel of health.

The list of her accomplishments is imposing from the first tuberculosis clinic held outside Multnomah County (in Deschutes County) in 1920 until the time when she resigned in 1951 as executive secretary of the Oregon Association, after 36 years of aggressive, intelligent and inspiring leadership in the field of tuberculosis control. She became a consultant to the board of directors, a post she still holds.

Although her health, due to all the many of her more active responsibilities, she is still sought after for her advice, counsel and leadership. Many an idea and a plan for health projects, for Governor Peterson's work with children and youth, for women's clubs, comes from her living room where people gather to discuss problems and programs with her.

Mrs. Dunbar has visited Klamath Falls and has many friends here.
