

# Henley Captures Jamboree With 51-45 Win Over Malin

Another overflow crowd, the second in as many nights, saw the Henley Hornets capture their own basketball jamboree and the Merrill Huskies' cop consolation laurels in the two-night hoop session that drew to a close Saturday night on the Hornets home floor.

The Hornets came from behind to trip a county league power, the Malin Mustangs, by a 15-45 count and Merrill did the same in capturing a 48-45 win from Bonanza, in two games that kept the crowd on the edge of their seats all night.

In the first game, between Merrill and Bonanza, the Huskies came alive after a slow first half start and took the lead in the hoop contest for the first time with five minutes remaining in the game.

Herb Schlecht's two free throws erased a Bonanza lead of 37-35 and set the Merrill quintet ahead, but not for long. The Mustangs came back with just a few seconds showing on the scoreboard, but Merrill wasn't through yet.

Just before the horn sounded, Schlecht again got his hands on the sphere and sank another lay-in to put the Huskies ahead 48-45 as the horn sounded ending the game.

The Huskies overcame the surprising Antlers, who held a 10-3 lead in the early minutes of the first quarter before Merrill could find the range, a 12-6 lead at the first quarter, 32-18 at halftime, and a 33-30 third period lead by the red and white cagers from Bonanza.

The Antler downfall was accredited a great deal with their ice cold start following the intermission as Merrill held them to a single free throw in the third period while scoring 12 points themselves, cutting the Antler lead to three points.

Schlecht led the Huskies in scoring with 27 points, while Terry Sherrill pumped through 14 to aid the Merrill cause, while Bonanza's Janssen bucketed 18 counters for high honors of the jamboree.

In the early minutes of the second game, which was a repeat of the opening half of the second night, Henley overcame a Malin first quarter lead to take in a 26-25 halftime lead over the Mustangs, thanks to an unbelievable shot by Gerald Arant.

A last half minute basket by Malin's Roger Dokken soon put Henley in front by a 28-24 margin to snap a Henley lead, and as the fans got ready to take their halftime stretch, Henley Arant cut loose with a three-quarter length of the court shot that arched over the backboard and into the hoop giving the Hornets their 26-25 lead as the half ended.

Malin never passed the Henley lead again, but Ray Johnson brought the Mustangs within one point of the feat as the fourth quarter opened as he sank a field goal making the score 38-37 in Henley's favor.

The Mustangs tried again late in the quarter on Glen Sierzyk's bucket which made the score 42-45, but a free throw by Henley Wright and a field goal by Ted Bostky finished the scoring for the Hornets as the game drew to a close, with the scoreboard reading 51-Henley and 45-Malin.

Norm Oliva's six points in the first period aided the Mustangs to their 16-10 lead, and six points on the three field goals by Henley's Randy Monismoney along with Arant's last second desperation shot gave Henley their halftime lead as they over came the Mustangs.

Montgomery again paced the Henley scorers in the third period with another six points, while the ball hawking and floor play of Dale Seawing and Arant helped the Hornets to a great victory.

The evening's scoring honors went to Montgomery with a total of 18 points, while Seawing was next in line with 12 counters. Malin's Don Rajnos also had 12 points, while John Rajnos collected 11.

### Cal Whips Webfoots; Beavers Edge Broncos

A surprise Gonzaga triumph over Washington State and a rebound by last year's Northern Division title, Oregon State, to trip highly-rated Santa Clara opened Saturday night's Pacific Northwest college basketball.

The Beavers, beaten 52-66 by California Friday night, test another Southern Division Coast Conference stalwart, Southern California, in a two-game series next Friday and Saturday nights at Corvallis.

Gonzaga, playing its first game, solved Washington State's attack and platoon basketball could save the game for the Cougars at Pullman Saturday night in its 69-61 defeat.

At Corvallis, Oregon State put two men on Santa Clara's 5-foot-6 center Ken Sears and held him to four points in a low-scoring ball control 30-34 victory. Sears raved for 30 points in the Broncos' 58-48 win over Oregon the night before.

In the first game of the double-header, California took a commanding 40-20 halftime lead to outscore Oregon 64-52. Forty-nine fouls were called in a close-checking battle.

Washington's attack sputtered and stalled at Seattle but fired enough to take a 60-58 win for a second straight victory over the hula boys from the University of Hawaii. Six-foot-eight Dean Parsons tallied 21 points for the Huskies.

Down south, UCLA held the upper hand after the early stages to whip Kansas State, 85-57. Stanford roughshod over St. Mary's 92-71.

Idaho was overwhelmed by too much Utah height at Salt Lake, dropping a second straight game there, 71-54.

The high-powered Seattle U. Chieftains romped to a 85-48 win over Western Washington at Bellingham, with Cal Bauer tossing in 19 points while in the game. In addition to the Oregon clash Tuesday, the Chieftains return home to go against Idaho State Friday and Saturday nights. Idaho State knocked Seattle U. out of the NCAA playoffs at Corvallis 77-75 in overtime last March.

At Logan, Utah, Utah State trounced Idaho State 68-58 Saturday night.

**IRISH COACH HAPPY OVER TEAM'S SEASON**
