

PC Conference Brass To Urge Regional TV

PASADENA, Calif. (U. P.)—Officials of the Pacific Coast Conference moved Wednesday to give the nation's football television fans a better choice in 1955, and they debated a recommendation that the public be let in on some of the conference secrets.

The conference said it will urge the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. at its meeting in New York Jan. 7 to adopt a regional plan of football TV next fall.

The proposed TV proposition would eliminate the "Game of the Week" idea—one game per week across the nation. Instead, the country would be divided into sections—not necessarily the present eight NCAA districts—and each region would program its college gridiron attractions.

The regional plan would permit no crossing of lines during the regular season, and colleges would be permitted only one game at home and one away to be televised. There would be no room left for doubt that the sport was football and the violation pertained to recruiting methods.

There would be no restriction on Friday and Saturday night dates, nor any after Thanksgiving Day. The latter would permit such late season games as Army-Navy, Notre Dame-Southern California and other attractions to be viewed Coast to Coast.

The proposal, exponents said, would be more elastic than a somewhat similar plan advanced for regional control by the Big Ten recently.

Harvey Cassell, director of athletics at the University of Washington and chairman of the NCAA Television committee outlined details of the proposal.

Meanwhile, the conference disclosed that a coach has been recommended for unethical recruiting practices.

The name of the coach, the school or actually the sport or the type of violation were not divulged. But there was no room left for doubt that the sport was football and the violation pertained to recruiting methods.

Prof. H. P. Everest, faculty representative of the University of Washington and press spokesman for the conference, upon the urgent request of news writers, said he would ask the faculty bodies to revise their policy of keeping details of such matters secret.

Merrill Edges Sacred Heart

Terry Sherrill sank a free throw with six seconds showing on the clock to give the Merrill Huskies a 46-45 victory over the Sacred Heart Trojans last night on the Academy floor.

The Huskies led at every quarter break by scores of 17-12, 32-24 and 36-31, in a very exciting season battle between the two county league rivals in a non-league battle.

Sacred Heart staged a last half surge, but couldn't match the early game scoring by Merrill which held the Trojan blast in the final two quarters.

Herb Schlicht topped the Merrill scorers with a total of 28 points, while Dean Michaels led Sacred Heart with his total of 19 counters. Sacred Heart turned in a 42-37 victory in the preliminary contest between the two schools' B squads.

Major Loop Owners Veto Player Request

NEW YORK (U. P.)—The major league owners rejected the most important requests of the player representatives at their joint meeting and at the same time gave the minor leagues the expected brushoff.

The majors slammed the door on all but a couple of minor requests of the players, such as approving mailing of contracts Jan. 15 instead of Feb. 1 and uniform

payment of expenses in spring training.

In explaining why the owners turned thumbs down on the players' demand for a boost in minimum salary from \$6,000 to \$7,200, Commissioner Ford Frick, who presided at the joint session, said:

"Such an increase would be a pretty expensive item, because in the case of players sent down to the minors, the major league club

would have to continue to pay the minimum salary."

Also vetoed was the request that present restrictions on winter ball participation be lifted.

The majors rejected an amendment by the minors restricting broadcasts and telecasts of big

league games within a radius of 50 miles of each home city. The owners, however, made an effort to help the minors financially by agreeing to pay minimum fees for

players brought up from class B, C and D leagues. They also agreed to pay part of the manager's salary

and the spring training expenses for clubs with which they have a working agreement.
