Indian's Life Span Reported

DENVER (AP) — Disease and unfavorable living conditions are keeping the Indian's 42-year life expectancy at the same level reached by white Americans in 1900, Indian Bureau welfare officials were told Tuesday.

Robert W. Beasley, the agency's welfare chief in Washington, said the average white American now lives to 69 years, compared with the Indian's average maximum of 42.

About 70 Interior Department welfare experts from reservations and Indian field offices in the western U.S. and Alaska are holding their annual technical conference here.

Reds Blast US, Formosa Arms Pact

TOKYO (AP) — Premier Chou En-lai of Communist China, in a blistering attack on the U.S.-Nationalist mutual defense pact Wednesday called the pact "a grave warlike provocation against the People's Republic of China."

In an official statement broadcast by Peiping Radio, Chou declared that unless the United

States withdrew "its armed forces" from Formosa, the nearby Pescadores and Formosa Strait "it must take upon itself all the grave consequences."

The U.S. 7th Fleet guards Formosa Strait from Communist invasion.

"Threats of war cannot shake the determination of the Chinese people to liberate Taiwan (Formosa)," Chou said in his second attack in three days on the pact signed last week in Washington.

The broadcast, also recorded in London, quoted the Red Premier as saying:

"To liberate Taiwan (Formosa) and to liquidate the traitorous Chiang Kai-Shek clique is a matter which falls entirely within the

scope of China's sovereignty and internal affairs and no interference by any foreign country will be tolerated.

"Threats of war cannot shake the determination of the Chinese people to liberate Taiwan, they can only heighten the indignation of the Chinese people."

"The Chiang Kai-Shek clique of

national betrayal has no authority whatsoever to conclude any treaty with any country.

"This treaty is a betrayal of China's sovereignty and territorial rights and is resolutely opposed by the Chinese people."

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West Leads In USAF Recruits

PARKS AIR FORCE BASE, California — The West led the nation percentage-wise in U.S. Air Force enlistments as recruiters of the 3506th USAF recruiting group topped the overall regional manpower goal for the month of November with 103 per cent of their objective.

Colonel Harold O. Allison, commander of western area recruiting activities, attributed this over-the-top procurement accomplishment to a growing knowledge of the advantages Air Force service offers today's youth and the Air Force now having complete control of its own recruiting program.

After only five months of operation as an independent organization, the western division of the Air Force Recruiting Service stepped out front to lead the nation in the percentage of enlistments attained.

"It is apparent that our enlistments increase, as the public becomes more and more aware of the training, benefits and advancement afforded young men and women through a well-rounded way of life called Air Force," Colonel Allison reported.

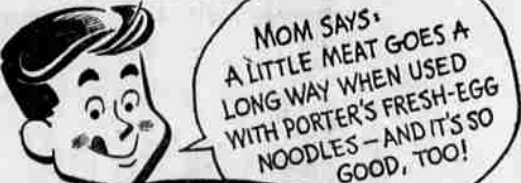
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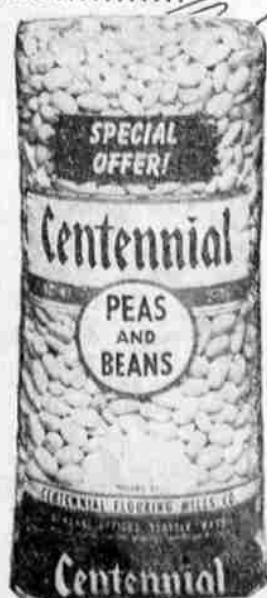
