Reds Protest US Indo Mission

TOKYO (AP)—Peiping radio said today the Communist-led regime of North Viet Nam has charged Gen. J. Lawton Collins' military mission to Indochina was an "extremely serious breach" of the Geneva armistice agreement.

Peiping said Pham Van Dong, foreign minister of North Viet Nam, had sent a protest to Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov of Russia and Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden of Britain, who acted as chairmen of the Geneva conference.

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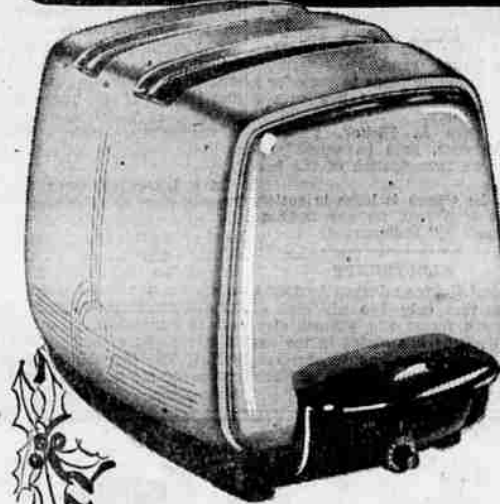

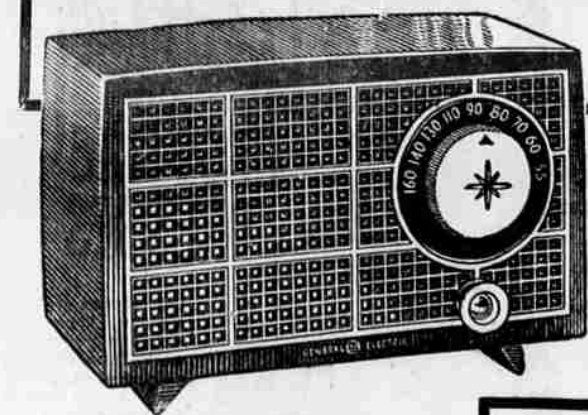
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
