# Foreign Aid Program Eyed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Foreign aid chief Harold E. Stassen has served notice he wants some solid answers when he goes to Paris next week for talks about European help in diplomatic terms, in discussing the aid plan at a news conference late yesterday.

He said the program has not reached the stage of decision on "dimensions and methods" but would be far less ambitious than the 15-billion-dollar Marshall Plan, which helped to restore economic health to Europe in seven years.

Stassen said the Asia aid program is a key part of U.S. foreign economic policy. The proposal will go to Congress in March, he said, and should be in operation two months later. It will depend primarily upon long-term loans instead of outright government grants, he said.

The "three pillars" of the proposal, he said, are the bringing forth of private capital (A) inside Asia itself, (B) from Europe to Asia and (C) from the United States to Asia. He said the program envisages "a minimum use of U.S. dollars."

# Truck Rates To Be Cut

WASHINGTON (AP)—Pacific Northwest truckers were under Interstate Commerce Commission orders Thursday to reduce some interstate freight rates by approximately 3 per cent.

An ICC order Wednesday said truckers generally increased interstate rates in the Northwest, starting in March 1953 by about 12 per cent. During the same period, increases of about 15 per cent became effective between certain points in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Utah.

The carriers argued the rates were planned to maintain a relation to intrastate rates, which they said vary in the Northwest.

However, the ICC held it was not reasonable to subject certain interstate freight to a higher charge than that applied to other shipments in the same general area.

The ICC ordered the reductions into effect Jan. 10.

# Oregon Educator Receives Award

Frank L. Ballard, associate director of Oregon State College extension service, has received the highest national award given by the extension service honorary fraternity.

Epsilon Sigma Phi presented its ruby award to the Oregon extension leader at a recent ceremony in Washington D.C. The award is made annually to one member of the fraternity for distinguished service to agriculture and rural life.

Selection is made by vote of the fraternity's 51 local chapters in this country, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Ballard was graduated from Oregon State College in 1916 and joined the OSC extension service the following year. He has served in the Oregon extension program continuously since that time except for a period in 1940-41 when he was president of Oregon State College.
