

Allies To Confer On Red's Note

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States, Britain and France will consult soon on a reply to Russia's latest note warning of a buildup in Communist military power to counter the proposed rearmament of West Germany.

Washington officials feel the note does not really foreshadow a new Red military buildup, but that it has some propaganda purposes.

The note, given to the three Western Powers in Moscow last night, said, "The Soviet Union and other peace-loving countries will carry out all necessary measures to step up their armaments and to safeguard their security."

It also said that making West Germany a partner in the Western European defense system and a member of the North Atlantic Alliance would render the unification of Germany impossible.

Both statements reflect the standard Soviet policy line which was developed almost a year ago at the Berlin Big Four conference and in a subsequent series of notes to Washington, London and Paris.

For propaganda purposes, the new Soviet warning is assumed here to be aimed at creating popular uneasiness and political division over the German rearmament issue in both France and West Germany.

As to an increase in the strength of Eastern European forces, it has always been assumed here that the forces in being were about as large as the Communists could maintain and far greater than they needed for purely defensive purposes.

The belief of officials here is that Soviet government leaders are resigned to the rearmament of West Germany and that they will not in fact take any radical new measures either to oppose it or to try to offset its effect once it is actually achieved.

These officials believe that what is happening in the broad picture is the hardening of a kind of military stalemate between East and West. They think this may result in a power balance that will last for years with each side exercising reasonable restraint on the use of its forces to avoid the devastations of an atomic war.

Former Prosecutor, Deputy Indicted In Phenix City

PHENIX CITY, Ala. (AP)—A prosecuting attorney and a former sheriff's deputy who rose to power during the racketeering heyday in Phenix City have been indicted as the killers of the man whose crusade against vice had won the approval of Alabama voters.

Circuit Solicitor Arch Ferrell and former Chief Deputy Sheriff Albert Fuller were held without bond on first-degree murder charges for the slaying June 18 of Atty. Gen. nominee A. L. Patterson.

Neither indictment said which of the two men the state contends fired three .38-caliber shots into Patterson's body. Under Alabama law a murderer and an accomplice are equally guilty and can be put to death in the electric chair.

DEFENDANT A third unidentified defendant was indicted with Ferrell and Fuller yesterday by the same grand jury which had smashed the vice empire that reigned here for many years.

Ferrell, 37, was described by Patterson and his associates as the "brain" of the Phenix City

political organization, and Fuller, 35, was denounced by vice prosecutors as the "master." Acting Atty. Gen. Bernard Sykes said he hopes to start the trials early in January.

Patterson's crime-fighting career ended the night of June 18 when a gunman waylaid him in an alley outside his law office here. He had won the democratic nomination for attorney general in a bitterly contested runoff primary June 1. Gamblers had spent untold thousands trying to defeat him.

Sheep Feed Warning Told

The open fall in most of Oregon this year has brought about a good growth of grass that in turn may be the downfall of some sheep producers, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson. This grass has a high water content and fills the abdominal cavity with very little dry matter. There is then a lack of sufficient carbohydrates and starch in the diet necessary for the animal to utilize fats stored in the body which may result in pregnancy disease.

Once the disease has become evident, little can be done about it, and chances for recovery are slight. Older ewes are more susceptible to the disease, but the young ones may become afflicted also.

Pregnancy disease may be headed off by using half to three-quarters of a pound of grain per ewe daily, or having molasses available for the ewe flock. As the gestation period progresses, the capacity of the abdominal cavity is lessened which means a more concentrated ration is necessary for ewes. Grass can't be depended upon as the entire ration, the county agent warns.
