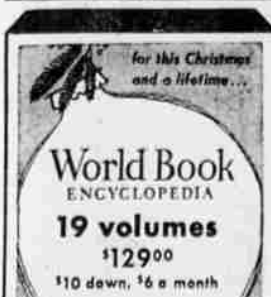
In observing problems of parents of teen-agers, Mary has worked out some sound theories:
