DAR Discusses Religious Heritage At December Business-Social Meet

During the regular business meeting, Mrs. M. E. Cooper gave a report of the successful cooked food and apron sale held in November, of which she was chairman. At the close of the business meeting, Mrs. Roland Wright gave a five minute resume of the Bricker Amendment as the monthly national defense topic.

Mrs. L. H. Stone was program chairman, with the topic, "Our Religious Background." She stated that the great men who founded the nation — Washington, Lincoln, Patrick Henry and all the signers of the Declaration of Independence — each recognized dependence on God.

Today a grave situation faces the country as more and more people are disregarding their religious heritage and the fruits of such a decision are shown in the

increase of crime, corruption in government and the increase of juvenile delinquency, Mrs. Stone said.

She recommended that families emphasize the guiding hand of Providence in their lives and in the life of the country. She advised that families read together the basic documents of the country so that they will know what is the American Heritage and that they read aloud "Key to Peace" by Clarence Manion.

After her statement that of the 48 states, only Oregon does not call on Divine Providence for help in its constitution preamble, the chapter passed a motion that a resolution be sent the Oregon Society, DAR, recommending that the state society be instrumental in seeing that Oregon acknowledges God in its preamble when the constitution is revised.
