The bride wore a ballerina length gown of white net and her fingertip veil was net, edged in lace. She carried a white prayer book topped with an orchid and satin streamers.

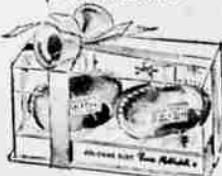
