

Neuberger Names Aides

PORTLAND (AP) — Sen.-elect Richard L. Neuberger Saturday announced he will take nine Oregon residents to Washington, D. C., to staff his office.

They are: John G. Jones, 46, Portland, administrative assistant; Hans Linde, 30, Portland, legislative assistant; Lloyd Tupling, 39, Portland, information specialist; Walter H. Dodd, Cottage Grove, 27, statistical clerk; Mrs. Vera Springer, Portland, receptionist; Mary Jane Christgau, Portland, office manager; and three assistant clerks, June B. Cyrus, Helen Nickum and Barbara A. Webber, all of Portland.

"Because they are without previous experience in congressional work, there may be a few creaks and groans at first, I realize that. Yet I believe the people of Oregon will be patient, because they will recognize the value of having men and women on a senator's staff who know and love Oregon," Neuberger said.

Jones, Neuberger's campaign manager, lost to Rep. Sam Coon when he ran for congressman from Eastern Oregon in 1952.

Linde, a Portland attorney, formerly was law clerk for Justice William O. Douglas of the U. S. Supreme Court. He also was an attorney for the State Department for two years.

Tupling, a former United Press war correspondent and publisher of a weekly at Boise, has been manager of the National Helix Canyon Assn. for the past year.

Neuberger reported that he has turned down all the 153 invitations he has received since the election to speak outside Oregon. He has accepted four that come after he takes office. The first will be before the National Women's Press Club in Washington, Jan. 5.

Collapsed Nyssa Bridge Restored

NYSSA, Ore. (AP) — Temporary repairs to the Snake River bridge, which collapsed Dec. 4, were far enough along Sunday that the bridge was re-opened to traffic.

Eventually the broken span which connects Oregon and Idaho will be replaced by a new bridge.

Repair crews have been working on an around-the-clock basis under direction of T. M. Stephenson, Salem, assistant state bridge engineer.

Work has been slowed by freezing weather.

NY Newspaper Strike Called

NEW YORK (AP) — The CIO Newspaper Guild, stalemated in contract negotiations with The New York Post, has called a strike for midnight Monday night.

In calling the strike Sunday night, Thomas J. Murphy, executive vice president of the guild's

New York local, said the Post "is insisting on exemption of additional employees from contract coverage, a clause providing lesser job security for some new employees, and a change in a part of the dismissal-severance pay protection clause."

He added that the union has offered to settle for a two-year wage increase package of \$5.80 "without any retrogression in old contract terms." Wage scales under the old contract, which expired Oct. 30, vary according to job classification. For reporters and rewriters, the top minimum pay is \$130.

The Post management issued a statement saying that if its proposals for contract changes were accepted, "The Post contract would continue to be the best in the city."

Nationalists Sink Red Ships

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP) — Nationalist Chinese warships Sunday sank two motorized boats and damaged two others and two gunboats in a fight in Formosa Strait, the defense ministry said Monday.

The action took place 23 miles south of tiny Wuchiu Island, 72 miles west of Formosa, the ministry said, and added:

"Concentrated fire sank two boats quickly and damaged four, which fled in the direction of the Red-held mainland."

HURRICANE MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay (AP) — Winds of hurricane force and heavy rain lashed Uruguay Sunday night, injuring 100 persons in the northern part of Artigas.

Amateur Sailors Reach Honolulu

HONOLULU (AP) — Amazed to hear they had been reported missing on their 48-day sailing from Japan, Dr. Earl L. Reynolds and his family are so pleased over the trip that they plan to continue around the world.

The 44-year-old U. S. atomic scientist had never sailed in deep water before he set out from Takamatsu, Japan, Oct. 26 in the 30-foot yacht Phoenix. Aboard were his wife, Barbara, two children, Jessica, 10, and Ted, 15, and three Japanese amateur crewmen, Niichi Mikamari, 31, Motosada Fushima, 23, and Mitsuji Suenitsu, 26.

They arrived here Saturday. Dr. Reynolds, who was an anthropologist with the Atomic Bomb Casualty Commission at Hiroshima, said they skirted two typhoons, weathered winter gales, but had good sailing weather most of the time for their two-masted ketch.

The Japanese Coast Guard had been trying to locate the yacht and there was some fear that it was lost. It had no radio transmitter although it had two receivers to pick up weather information.

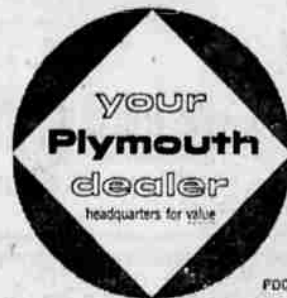
