Salk Vaccine To Be Offered

NEW YORK (AP)—The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis intends to make the Salk vaccine available for all of the nation's first and second-grade pupils if last summer's tests show the drug is effective.

The announcement was made by the foundation yesterday. The University of Michigan is conducting evaluation of the tests and the report on the study is expected next spring.

The foundation also said it had removed pregnant women from its original list of those scheduled to receive the vaccine. They were replaced by the second-graders, who have a higher polio attack rate.

Santa Claus Awaits Calls

WEST LEBANON, N. H. (AP)—"Hello, Santa, can you hear me? Thanks for all the gifts last year. Now this year..."

From now until Christmas, telephone operators all over the country will be channeling "calls for Santa Claus" to big-hearted Joseph Schanbler at his home here.

This is the sixth consecutive year that the 37-year-old Veterans Administration clerk has taken over the role of "St. Nick."

From 8 until 9 p.m., EST, children can call the "North Pole" just by telling the telephone operator "I want to talk to Santa Claus at West Lebanon, N. H."

The operator will put through the call, providing Mommy or Daddy pays the toll charge.

The 5-foot-6, 125-pound Schanbler volunteered to be Santa in 1948 when the nearby White River Junction, Vt., VFW post decided youngsters should have an opportunity to phone Christmas requests.

"This year three VFW posts are sponsoring the venture. The telephone company has installed a special switchboard."

Last year 3,500 youngsters called Schanbler. This year he expects twice as many calls. His wife Frances, 44, and four neighborhood children — his "helpers" — assist him.

Youngsters calling Schanbler receive the full "Santa workshop" treatment. Santa's cheery voice greets them; a music box plays; reindeer bells tinkle; and a 100-year-old bell peals.

Some parents write Schanbler in advance so when the youngster calls Santa he is either congratulated or admonished regarding his pre-yuletide behavior.

Rome Becoming Film Capital

ROME (AP)—Rome is rapidly becoming the Hollywood of Europe but Hollywood U.S.A. is making money in Italy.

The situation is "unique in the world," says Eitel Monaco, president of the Italian Motion Pictures Assn. He explains:

Hollywood U.S.A. is sending over fewer pictures yet "American distributing companies doing business in Italy are making more money than ever before." Box office receipts for American films rose from 48 million dollars in 1949 to 84 million in 1954. In 1953 Hollywood producers took 15 million out of Italy in net exportable earnings, an increase of five millions over 1949.

Movies have attracted an estimated 800 million people in Italy this year compared to 600 million in 1949.

The Italian industry, now turning out 160 films a year, is becoming an important factor in the country's economy.

This year Italian pictures are netting 10 million dollars in foreign revenue—compared to two million five years ago.

Red Chinese Answer To UN Meeting Proposal Awaited

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold and his aides settled down today to a spell of watchful waiting for an answer from Red China on Hammarskjold's proposed free-the-fliers trip to Peiping.

There was no comment immediately from U. N. officials on a Peiping radio broadcast early today asserting that the United Nations "has no right to interfere with China's sentencing of the American spies."

The broadcast, monitored in Tokyo, made no direct reference to Hammarskjold's cable to Premier Chou En-lai Friday night proposing that they meet in Peiping soon after Dec. 26 to discuss the case of the fliers and all other U. N. personnel still held captive.

The radio blast repeated Peiping's previous charges, which the Soviet Union had aired in the U. N. Assembly, that the jailed Americans had "sneaked into China by air to carry out espionage" and that "it is China's... sovereign right of punishing spies."

The U. N. Assembly has approved the U. S. contention that the fliers were prisoners of war entitled to release under the Korean armistice.

Regarding Peiping's failure so far to reply to Hammarskjold's cable, a U. N. spokesman said last night that the secretary general would not be disappointed if several days elapsed before a formal answer came.

"The answer may come directly, it may come roundabout," the spokesman said.

He added that it was too soon to think about setting a deadline for a reply.

Lattimore Move Planned

WASHINGTON (AP)—Owen Lattimore's attorneys sought in court arguments today to knock out a new two-count indictment against the controversial Far Eastern specialist.

They contended in advance briefs that "the sole issue would be Lattimore's opinion of his opinions," but U. S. Dist. Atty. Leo A. Rover replied that the legal attack on the indictment "can be reduced to an objection to the mere fact that he was indicted."

The hearing sent Rover once more before Dist. Judge Luther W. Youngdahl, whom he had accused earlier in an affidavit of having "a fixed personal bias and prejudice" in favor of Lattimore and a gainst the government.

Youngdahl struck Rover's affidavit from the record as "scandalous" and refused to disqualify himself from hearing the case.

The new indictment alleges that Lattimore lied when he told the Senate Internal Security subcommittee in 1952 that he (1) had never been a follower of the Communist line and (2) had never been a promoter of Communist interests.

It was returned after Judge Youngdahl had dismissed as too vague the key count of an earlier indictment which charged that Lattimore lied in denying that he was a Communist sympathizer or promoter of Red causes. The U. S. Court of Appeals upheld the dismissal by an 8-1 vote, but reinstated two other counts which Youngdahl had thrown out.

Lattimore has denied allegations of procommunism.

Motor Courts Stage Price War

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP)—A motor court price war — with rooms free — begins tomorrow unless all operators here along U. S. 1 take down price signs.

J. E. Freeman, president of the Daytona Area U. S. Highway 1 Assn., reported 40 of the 90 courts between Ormond Beach and South Daytona have pledged to rent their cottages free.

"We'll continue to do so until every price sign is taken down," he added.

U.S. University Rolls Increase

CINCINNATI (AP)—Attendance at the nation's colleges and universities is on the upswing.

Dr. Raymond Walters, president of the University of Cincinnati, said last night the full-time enrollment increased 6.8 per cent this autumn over last. He based his figures on a survey of 846 four-year colleges, which said they had 1,382,750 full-time students.
