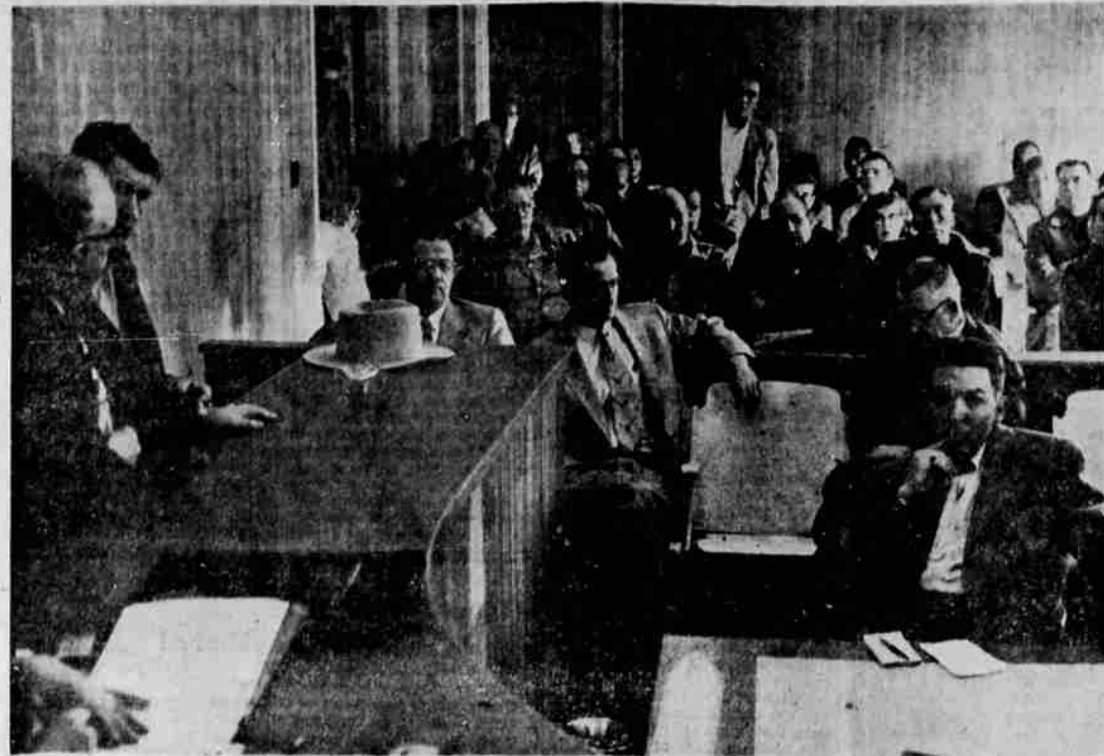

AF Academy Offers Cadet Posts To Young Americans

For the first time in history, qualified young men are now offered an education at the United States Air Force Academy. Those selected to be Air Force Academy cadets will be carefully chosen on a competitive basis. They will be educated for leadership and trained in the science of airmanship. Graduates will receive a bachelor of science degree and be commissioned second lieutenants in the United States Air Force.

The final selection of the 300 Air Force cadets for the first class, and subsequent classes, will be made by the Air Force Academy Admissions Board.

Arresting officers said they apprehended the men on the Klamath River Sunday.

3 Accidents Mar Weekend Three persons were taken to the Klamath Valley Hospital for treatment as the result of three motor accidents the past weekend. Mrs. Rena Gibbons, Chiloquino, was hurt when the car, in which she was a passenger, operated by her son, Harvey Gibbons, hit a slick spot on Highway 97 near Modoc Point and went over the bank. Also hospitalized were Mary Lee Lott, 30, Hackamore, and Moses Canton, passengers in a car operated by George Grimes Jones, a workman on Southern Pacific extra gang 11. According to Oregon State Police the Jones vehicle crashed headon into another operated by David J. Kingsford, Merrill. Neither driver or passengers in the Kingsford car were injured. The accident occurred shortly before 10 p.m. Sunday night on Highway 33 a short distance east of Merrill. Jones was arrested for failure to drive on the right side of the highway. In another accident about 11 a.m. Sunday, Clarence Willard Peison, 5421 Avalon, took a spill on his motor-scooter and suffered cuts and bruises. The accident occurred when Peison attempted to pass a Freightliner cattle truck, northbound on Washburn Way. The scooter hit a rough spot in the road and spilled the rider to the pavement; the scooter sliding under the trailer. The boy was not hospitalized, the police report stated. The condition of the three hospitalized victims could not be learned this morning.
