### 4-H Forestry Award Won

Tim Bagley, 17-year-old Clatsop County high school boy and a national winner of an industry-sponsored 4-H forestry project, typifies the new look in forestry in the Pacific Northwest.

Son and grandson of loggers, young Bagley already is well on his way toward a forestry career. A \$300 scholarship just given him by American Forest Products Industries will help him through forestry school at Oregon State College.

Even before the scholarship was announced at the annual 4-H Congress in Chicago, December 2, Bagley's ability to manage a 40-acre stand of 70-year-old Douglas Fir on his father's farm was well established. Since starting his 4-H forestry activities four years ago, he has compiled an impressive record of county and state honors.

Since management has put forestry on a permanent footing, young Bagley can look forward to a bright future in his chosen field.

Tim started his 4-H forestry program in 1951, when he was in the eighth grade. From a modest beginning on a tiny 1-16th of an acre, he fashioned a project that is now receiving national acclaim.

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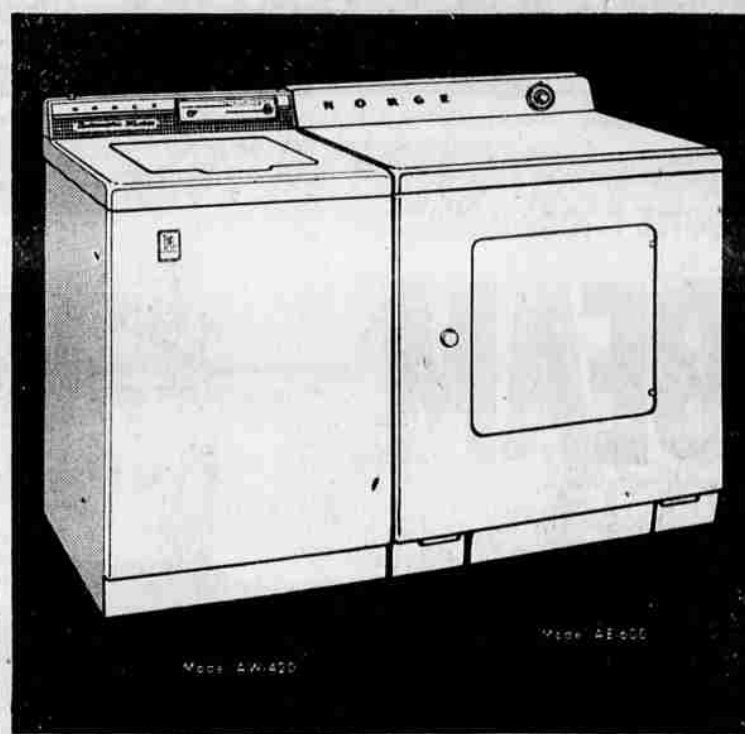
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
