Solon Predicts Red Advances

LOS ANGELES (R-Calif) — Sen. Knowland (R-Calif) predicted last night that under certain circumstances the Soviets in 1955 or 1956 might move into parts of the world they do not now occupy.

He said this could come about if there is "a power vacuum or an indication of weakness," and it might be the Soviets themselves or action through Red China.

He added in a talk sponsored by the American Bureau for Medical Aid for Free China that he expected "great pressure" in 1955 to get Red China into the United Nations. This, he said, would only give prestige to Russia in the eyes of the world and then "all of Asia will go down."

Hooper Rating Chief Killed

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — C. E. Hooper, nationally known radio executive who founded the Hooper system of rating radio and television programs, was killed yesterday when he fell into the whirling blades of an air boat propeller while duck hunting on Great Salt Lake. He was 56.

He died a few minutes after he was brought to a Salt Lake City hospital, his body almost cut in two by the propeller.

Frank McClatchy, of Salt Lake City, one of two men with Hooper in the boat, said the radio executive jumped out of the craft when it lodged on a sand bar. He attempted to push it loose, slipped and fell into the spinning blades. An air boat has an airplane-like propeller mounted on the rear for use in shallow water.

Hooper was president of C. E. Hooper, Inc., New York City, which specializes in studies of radio audience measurement.

His home was in South Norwalk, Conn. He is survived by his widow and a daughter.

Sale Of US Farm Surpluses To Reds Studied By Benson

NEW YORK (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson says the administration is considering direct trade in agricultural surpluses with Russia and its satellites.

At a news conference yesterday, Benson said study would be given both to direct sales of such commodities to Iron Curtain countries and to trade with "third party" nations which might sell to the Soviet Union.

"My feeling is that we should be willing to trade with Iron Curtain countries so long as the trade is in our favor, whether it be butter or anything else," Benson said, adding:

"We are considering some sales to countries which may in turn sell to Iron Curtain countries."

In any event, the agriculture secretary said, it was difficult to "police" sales of American goods to Russia.

Last January a U.S. broker was denied a license to buy surplus American butter for export to Russia.

In line with Benson's statement, however, there were reports that the administration would reassess the situation at meetings to be held within a few days.

Benson also said he was giving "serious consideration" to revising the entire farm parity formula.

He said revision would include "re-weighting" of some of the factors involved in the formula.

Asked if the farmers would get a "better shake" out of a contemplated formula revision, Benson replied:

"They may, but the end objective is to make the formula up-to-date and as accurate as possible as a measuring rod."

Benson and the Republican administration instituted a "flexible" support policy in place of the previous administration's "rigid" supports.

The boys' parents were in Boston, where Mrs. Grove is expecting the birth of a fourth child soon.
