With the holidays so close at hand it is well to remember that ice cream is one of the real fun foods. Its entertainment value has never been accurately appraised. It has been enjoyed by the very young and the very old. Its endless variety and its coolness are pleasant in themselves, and ice cream actually adds the festive note to most meals, parties, and at snack time.

Neither has its true stature as a fine food been fully appreciated. Actually, ice cream is one of the top-ranking dairy foods nutritionally. Its simple formula calls for the majority of its ingredients, 80 per cent to 85 per cent, to be cream and milk solids, the balance sugar and various flavorings.

Ice cream contains all of the important nutrients of milk only in different proportions. Because the modern manufacturers want to build up the body and food value of the ice cream they place additional milk solids in the formula. The milk solids portion of milk is nutritionally significant. It furnishes protein, needed minerals, and various water-soluble vitamins. This, coupled with cream, makes ice cream a top grade dairy food.

One of ice cream's assets is its easy digestibility. This means the nutrients are readily available. One-sixth quart of average vanilla ice cream supplies an individual with significant amounts of his daily need for riboflavin, Vitamin A, fat, calcium, phosphorus, and important amount of protein and thiamine.

It is recognized as a basic-seven food by the federal government. In addition to contribution to the nation's fun and its health, it is important economically.

Here is the recipe that won \$25,000 at Pillsbury's Sixth Grand National Recipe and Baking Contest.

OPEN SESAME PIE
Submitted by Mrs. Bernard A. Koteen, Washington, D.C.

Bake at 450 degrees F for 10 to 12 minutes, makes 9 inch pie.

Toast 2 to 4 tablespoons sesame seeds in 9-inch pie pan at 325 degrees F for 8 to 10 minutes until light golden brown. Remove seeds. Then turn oven to 450 degrees F.

Sift together 1 cup sifted Pillsbury Best Enriched Flour and 1/2 teaspoon salt into mixing bowl. Add the toasted sesame seeds.

Out in 1/4 cup shortening until particles are the size of small peas.

Sprinkle 3 to 4 tablespoons cold water over mixture, a little at a time, while tossing and stirring lightly with fork. Add water to moisten particles, pushing lumps to side, until dough is just moist enough to hold together.

Form into a ball. Flatten to about 1/2 inch thickness. Smooth dough at edges.

Roll out on floured pastry cloth or board to a circle 1 1/2 inches larger than inverted 9-inch pie pan. Fit loosely into pie pan. Gently pat out air pockets, fold edge to form a standing rim. Flute. Prick generously with fork.

Bake in hot oven 450 degrees F. 10 to 12 minutes until golden brown. Cool.

DATE CHEFFON FILLING

Soften 1 envelope 1 tablespoon gelatin in 1/4 cup cold water.

Beat together 1 1/2 cups milk, 2 egg yolks, 1/4 cup sugar and 1/2 teaspoon salt in top of double boiler until well blended.

Cook over hot water or directly over low heat stirring constantly until mixture will coat a metal spoon.

Add the softened gelatin. Stir until dissolved, chill until almost set, stirring occasionally.

Fold in 1/4 cup whipping cream, beaten until very thick. 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1 cup pitted dates, chopped very fine.

Beat 2 egg whites until slight mounds form when beater is raised. Add 2 tablespoons sugar gradually, beating well after each addition. Continue beating to make a meringue which stands in stiff, glossy peaks when beater is raised. Fold into the date mixture.

Spoon into cooled, baked shell, heaping into fluffy mounds. Chill until firm. If desired, sprinkle lightly with nutmeg before serving.
