Winter Play Program Told

Winter recreation activities are in the offing — many of them dependent on proper weather — according to Bob Bonney, city park and recreation director.

Several improvements have been made at the skating rink at Moore Park and the park superintendent, Bert Stott, and his crew are working every night to get the rink in order. So far, there has not been sufficient freezing to seal the rink and provide good skating; but, weather permitting, ice skating will resume.

Improvements at the rink include enlargement of the warming hut, the skating rink and development of a parking area across the road. The warming hut exterior has been sided with redwood and a shed for snow removal equipment is included.

Skating rink patrons are asked to use the heated rest rooms at Moore Park since it is economically impractical to plumb to the rink for the limited time the facilities would be in use and still comply with city ordinances.

The ski tow at Moore Park and the sledding area at Conger hill are ready for snow. The sledding area has been improved to include a run for toboggans, sleds and skis.

Tax Article Said In Error

A story appearing in the Herald and News December 8 quoting Manning Becker, extension farm management specialist at Oregon State College, pertaining to benefits to farmers from revisions in income tax laws is erroneous, according to Adolph Zamsky of the Rodolph, Zamsky Company.

The article stated that if a farmer does not file an estimate by January 15, he can file a final return by February 15. Zamsky says: "This I believe is in error as according to the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, Sec. 6015 (f) (1), the applicability of the changes of dates for individuals and farmers does not change until taxable years beginning after December 31, 1954. Final filing dates if estimates are made have been changed to April 5, 1954."
