(Cecil) Brown placed first in Klamath county grange competition in the tree fruit and berry division for her jars of pears and mountain huckleberries, which were then entered in the state contest at Portland, where she was given third prize for the canned huckleberries, receiving 50 pounds of sugar each for county and state awards, with an additional prize of an electric coffee-maker in the state division.

Mrs. Grant P. Brown was awarded 25 pounds of sugar for placing second in the county contest in the tree fruit and berry category.

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An after-game party was given for Grants Pass Presbyterians coming to Klamath Falls for the football game last fall. This was so successful that the parties will be continued for visiting schools.

Canada Seed Crop Reported

Latest official estimates from Canada indicate that some of that country's seed crops this year were even smaller than was earlier expected. In most cases, this year's crops were smaller than in 1953.

The Canadian Department of Agriculture has just issued a second estimate of this year's seed crops. Seed production there was seriously affected by very unfavorable conditions for harvesting. Wet and cold weather was general in all seed producing areas during September and October in Eastern Canada. Immature crops were hurt by frost in Western Canada. Further revisions in the estimates may be necessary a little later because of the losses at harvest time.

Alfalfa, red clover and bromegrass were the principal seed crops that were not as large as was expected earlier.

The alfalfa seed crop in Canada is larger than was originally reported but still far short of the 1953 crop. Around 5 1/2 million pounds is the latest estimate. This compares to 9 1/2 million pounds in 1953. Earlier this year the forecast was about 3 1/2 million pounds.

On Christmas Eve at 11 p.m. there will be a candlelight carol service in the church. All are invited to attend this service.

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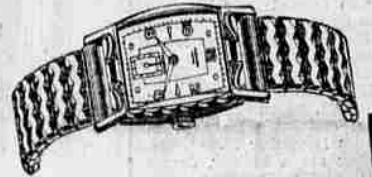
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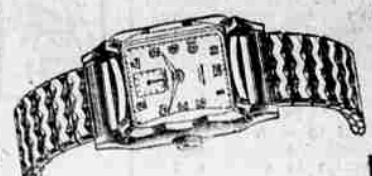
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
