

Pentagon To Unveil Newest Military Training Program

The Defense Department unveils today its new military training and reserve plan and tries to explain why it should be approved by congressmen traditionally wary of anything like European-style conscription.

All previous efforts at establishing universal military training in the United States have failed in Congress. Foes have called US "anti-American," "totally foreign" and "unduly costly. Advocates, on the other hand, have backed it as a method of building up a trained manpower pool which would enable the nation to cut down its standing military forces.

The Pentagon's new plan is known to be accompanied by a request for an extension of the draft law, due to expire next June 30, and by a request for pay increases to career soldiers.

The program calls for training of some 100,000 youths annually for periods of six months.

The goal is to establish a ready pool of trained reservists totaling 2 1/2 million.

About 2,000 men would continue to be drafted each month. Youths would be permitted to volunteer for the short-term training period at considerably lower pay than draftees receive. They would not automatically qualify for veterans' benefits, and their total liability for military service would extend at least nine years.

By comparison, the youth who waited for the draft would be a veteran after his two years' service and know that his military recall liability, except in the direst emergency, would end six years thereafter.

Present law contains no teeth to compel former draftees to continue active reserve training. Secretary of Defense Wilson has said he supports the idea of assuring that six-month trainees continue their reserve activities by making them liable to the draft for a full 24 months of active duty if they fail to keep up their reserve duties.

Demos To Fill Senate Posts

PORTLAND (AP) — Six names were proposed Thursday night by the Multnomah County Democratic Central Committee as acceptable for two vacancies in the State Senate.

The county commissioners plan to make the appointments next week and the party committee in an argument-torn session approved these: Joseph Carson, defeated candidate for governor; Alfred Corbett, state representative; George Frände, attorney and former legislator; Harry George, attorney; Ken Kraemer, former legislator; and Victor Rosenfeld, finance manager for the successful congressional campaign of Edith Green.

The arguments came on an attempt to add the name of Lew Wallace, long-time leading figure in the Democratic Party and a defeated candidate for the Senate. Chairman Ken Kinke ruled for a secret ballot on which Wallace lost, 43-38.

The secret ballot ruling was appealed by French La Salle, secretary of the District Council of Carpenters, on the ground party affairs should be "in the open." Before the arguing on that was over, the sergeant-at-arms had stepped toward La Salle, but did not eject him.

The Senate vacancies are those left by election of Richard Neuberger to the U. S. Senate and Jack Bain to the Multnomah County commission.

Westler Files Divorce Charge

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — George P. Temple Jr., brother of actress Shirley Temple, has filed suit for divorce against his wife Patricia Ruth. The former wrestler charged desertion and cruelty.

Mrs. Temple, 23, separated from her husband in 1952, is involved in litigation over the paternity of her 5-month-old daughter Kenny Ann. She has named Harle Duane Peterson, 28-year-old actor, as the father.

'54 Deer Kill Equals '53

Initial returns of hunter report cards indicate that this year's deer kill will easily equal the one for 1953.

By the end of November of this year, 120,376 hunter report cards had been returned to the Portland office of the game commission. The total reported kill on these cards were 70,068 deer.

Preliminary reports from the auditing division of the game commission also indicate more deer tags were issued for the 1954 season than for the preceding one.

After the deer report cards have been counted, a questionnaire will be sent the hunters selected at random, to check the accuracy of the report cards and also obtain further information regarding the kill by persons not reporting.

Last year, only 60 per cent of the deer hunters returned their report cards. This year's total is not yet known, but as in the past two years the return of cards from the archers is behind that of the rifle hunters.

The game commission urges all hunters to send in their report cards. The information contained on the cards is important in the management of Oregon's deer herds. Also, a hunter may be required to license next year if the report is not returned this year.

If the card has been lost, a two cent post card is an acceptable substitute providing it contains the area hunted, county, nearby towns or landmarks, type of deer killed (buck, doe, or fawn), and in the case of a buck, the number of antler points on each side. Also, the hunter should state the number of days hunted and sign and return the card to the Oregon Game Commission, P.O. Box 4138, Portland, Oregon.

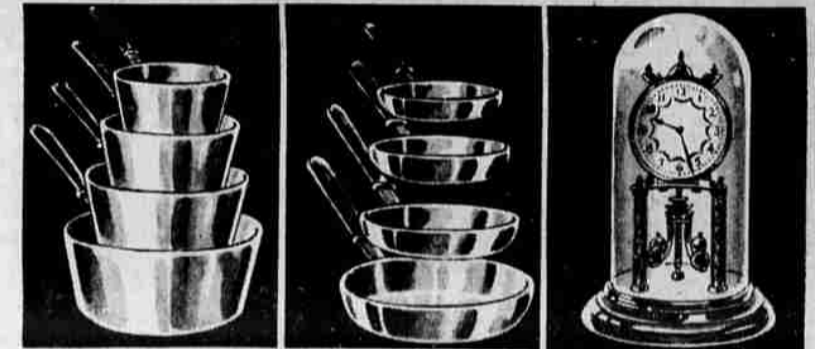

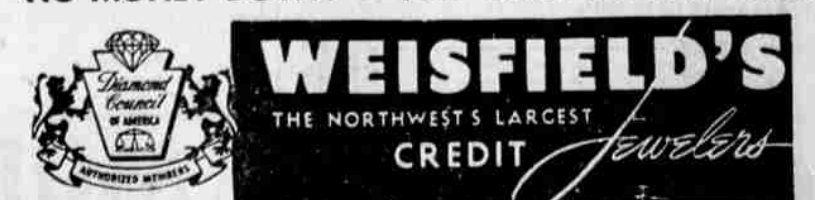
