Man Dies From Car Injuries

Injuries suffered in a traffic accident at Fort Klamath on November 21 resulted in the death of Ernest Dawson, resident of Seaside at Klamath Valley Hospital Thursday, December 16. He was 76 years old.

The aged man was struck by a car driven by Stephen P. Collins, Fort Klamath as Dawson crossed Highway 62 near Fort Klamath. Collins was not held.

Collins told state police he had glanced to the left at a pickup passing his vehicle and when he looked ahead again Dawson was directly in the path of his car.

Dawson suffered a compound fracture of the left leg, a broken wrist and head injuries.

He was in Fort Klamath on a flashing red light when the accident happened.

He is survived by several sisters and one brother.

The body is being shipped to Seaside by O'Hair's Memorial Chapel for services and interment.

Land Bureau Announces Timber Sale

Multiple bids were received for all 12 tracts of timber offered for sale today by the Medford office of the Bureau of Land Management. The total offered for the 16 million board feet was \$417,373.70, an average of \$26.61 per M. All successful bids were above the appraised price in amounts varying from 1.7 per cent to 104 per cent. Highest price offered for Douglas fir was \$23.25 per M by the A. C. Smith Lumber Co. for a tract of 1,250,000 board feet on upper Cow Creek in Douglas County. Highest price bid for pine was \$40.00 per M for ponderosa pine and \$45.00 per M for sugar pine by Packett & Scherer on a tract of 2 1/2 million board feet south of Lincoln in Jackson County.

High bidders were: A. C. Smith Lumber Co., three tracts totaling 3,854,000 Bd. ft.; Packett & Scherer, one tract, 2,660,000 Bd. ft.; Kogap Lumber Co., one tract, 1,375,000 Bd. ft.; Magnolia Lumber Co., one tract, 1,076,000 Bd. ft.; S. H. & W. Lumber Co., one tract, 1,076,000 Bd. ft.; 2,365,000 Bd. ft.; Joe Estremado, one tract, 207,000 Bd. ft.; Wayne Bate Lumber Co., one tract, Ash, one tract, 293,000 Bd. ft.; Robert Dollar Co., one tract, 1,046,000 Bd. ft.; Hoot Owl Lumber Co., one tract, 80,000 Bd. ft.

Most of the timber was additional tracts offered for sale by the bureau in order to help alleviate the log shortage that developed as a result of the strikes in the lumber industry last summer.

The additional volume was withheld in the total volume that can be sold from the O&K lands each year in perpetuity under the sustained program under which the Bureau of Land Management operates its forest lands in Western Oregon according to E. K. Peterson, District Forester.

One tract containing 5,482,000 Bd. ft. of Douglas fir and other species located in the Upper Grave Creek area will be offered for sale by the bureau of January 13, 1955. Information regarding this timber may be secured from the District Forester's office in the Medford City Hall.
