

Exchange of Vows In Tululake Community Presbyterian Church Unites Prominent Ranching Names

Tall baskets of blue chrysanthemums and white roses, with touches of silver, and lighted white tapers in tall seven-branched candelabra adorned the altar at Community Presbyterian Church, Tululake, Sunday afternoon, December 12, for the wedding of Doris Jean Porterfield, Doris, and Walter Wendell Fotheringham, Merrill.

The 2:30 p.m. nuptial service was read by the Rev. Martin J. Keyser in the presence of more than 300 guests. Mrs. Ross Ragland, Tululake, played the wedding march and other atmospheric organ music and accompanied vocal soloist, Mrs. Byard Kelly of Doris.

The bride was given in marriage by her brother, Raymond Porterfield of Palo Alto. Her attendants were her cousin, Ardis Williams of Portland and Betty Jean Logan, Doris.
