CHICAGO LIVESTOCK CHICAGO (AP) — Hogs jumped 25 to 50 cents Friday as salable receipts fell to 3,500 head, smallest for any day this year.

Buyers paid \$13.50 to \$15.50 for 160 to 180 pound butchers, \$15.75 to \$16.25 for 190 to 230 pounders and \$15.25 to \$15.75 for 290 to 350 pounders.

Steers and heifers sold steady to 50 cents lower. High choice and prime steers topped at \$23.00.

Buyers paid \$19.00 to \$21.50 for good and choice native spring lambs.

A roundup of persons described by Sheriff Murray Britton as "reservation rowdies" had resulted Friday in the prosecution of six men and one woman for a series of crimes involving liquor.

Held in the county jail after appearances before Justice of the Peace Jack Gritton of Bly are Harold Foster, 18, assault and battery, \$24 fine; Kenneth Waiah, 28, giving alcoholic beverages to minors, \$54 fine and 30 days; Berline Davis, 30, disorderly conduct, \$29 fine and 5 days; Quincy Baker, 48, drunken driving, \$400 bail; Harold H. Davis, 54 fine and 40 days; Orville Wright, disorderly conduct, 60 days, and Luis Escontrios, drunk in a public place, \$25 and 30 days.

The seven persons were arrested at Beauty by deputy sheriffs Woody Joe, Alvie Youngblood, Jess Bryant and George Foster. They staged a series of raids on wine parties under orders from Sheriff Britton.

Britton said wine parties on the reservation have led to many fights and other disturbances. He declared many law-abiding residents on the reservation have complained against hoodlum activities in the area.
