

Lumber Mill Site Moved

CHILOQUIN — Frank Riley, whose lumber mill burned to the ground recently, has announced he is moving operations to Neubieber, California, and will not rebuild the plant on Sprague River.

The mill, located about two miles east of Chiloquin, had suffered a fire in sawdust piles near the burner in June. The Klamath Agency fire department brought the fire under control before extensive damage could be done.

On July 21, a fire broke out at 5:30 p.m., between the time when the mill crew had left work and before the night watchman was due to report at 7 p.m. The blaze was spotted by Klamath Agency lookouts and Victor Sisson, fire control officer for the Agency, sent a full crew to fight the fire. It was impossible to save the mill but they prevented the fire from spreading into nearby timber.

Arrangements had been underway at the time, it is reported, between Riley and an insurance company to arrange a new policy on the mill but they had not been completed, so it was a complete loss.

The fire meant a payroll loss for the Chiloquin area of seven mill workers and about the same number of loggers. Most of the men have gone to work in other local logging and mill operations.

Shasta Death Said Suicide

MT. SHASTA—The death of Roy Carr, 21-year-old Mt. Shasta man late August 6, was determined to be from a self-inflicted bullet wound, according to Chester Case, deputy sheriff and coroner and Felix Gasperi, chief of police, Mt. Shasta, who witnessed the incident. A third witness was Mrs. Howard Williver at whose home the shooting occurred.

According to the officers' reports Carr, a Navy veteran had returned to Mt. Shasta from Oroville and went to the Williver home, about 11 a.m., threatening to shoot himself. Officers arrived as he used a .38 calibre gun to put a bullet into his brain. He lived until 4 p.m.

Survivors include his father, Archie Carr, Weed, his mother, Mrs. Dora Carr, and a sister, Juanita Patterson, Oroville. Funeral services are pending. The body is at Noble's Mortuary, Mt. Shasta.

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Arthur S. Matthews, a pioneer in the field of color television, died at his home yesterday. He was 52. Matthews was president of Color Television, Inc., a San Francisco firm. He entered the business end of the television industry after the war.

New Hilton Hostelry Puts Oldsters In Drab Category

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (UP)—Hotelman Conrad Hilton today described his new 17 million dollar Beverly Hilton Hotel as the most

luxurious hostelry in the world and said it would serve as headquarters for his world-wide operations.

The 450-room structure, scheduled for a public opening Friday, was previewed yesterday by scores of leading entertainers and personalities as well as a national television audience. Many guests were flown in from other cities in which Hilton owns hotels.

Hilton's new hotel features \$45 dinners, refrigerators in every room and individual climate control units which guests may adjust to the type of weather they prefer. Television and radio sets are available in every room.

A helicopter landing port is located on the roof of the plush eight-story building. Some 300 guest rooms are provided with private balconies which overlook an olympic-size swimming pool and tropical gardens. The view takes in the Hollywood Hills, Beverly Hills and downtown Los Angeles.

The hotel, destined to become the "flagship" of Hilton's chain, also includes six permanent and three mobile bars. A three-acre shopping center flanks the hotel on the Wilshire Boulevard. It was intended originally as a hide-away for fugitives from high income brackets, but seems likely to join Disneyland and the movie studios as a top tourist attraction.

Two Die In Plane Crash

STATELINE, Nev. (UP)—A San Francisco man was killed and his companion was seriously injured yesterday when their plane crashed into a tree in the High Sierra just above Lake Tahoe.

Killed in the accident was William E. Holt, 22, a Pan American World Airways employe. His 18-year-old wife is expecting their first baby in a few weeks.

Seriously injured was James C. Headrick, 26, an employe of the Nystrom Aviation Company of Palo Alto. He came here three weeks ago from Chattanooga, Tenn. He was rushed to Carson City Hospital for surgery.

Witnesses said their Piper Tri-Pacer touched down on the abandoned Tahoe Village airstrip, then climbed back into the air. Constable William Stambaugh of Tahoe Village said the engine "appeared to be turning over smoothly but it seemed to lack enough power to clear the mountains" on the east side of Tahoe.

The plane smashed into the base of a tree near the Kingsbury Grade, only three feet away from a tent occupied by Tom Bialerla of Babbs, Nev. Bialerla was uninjured. The plane had taken off from Reno yesterday morning.

Pakistan Medic Tells Of Woman Turned To Man

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Dr. Munawar Ali, president of the Pakistan Medical Association, says he will make a formal report in a month or so on a rare operation by which a woman was transformed into a man.

Dr. Ali, who has just concluded a tour of medical installations in the United States, said the surgical case was well known in international medical circles although it never has received the publicity of the better known Christine Jorgensen operation.

All said the patient had lived as a married woman for several months before it was found that she should have been born a man. All began plastic surgery. He said the patient now was a man and married to a woman and their sex life together for several months is normal. All said so far the couple have been unable to have children.

"That," he said, "will take further study."
